At 11 a.m. on the 11th day of the 11th month of , dozens of world leaders gathered in Paris to mark years since the armistice that ended World War I entered into force, and to celebrate peace.

There it was resolved to form an "Ethiopian Legion" in the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan , but not to use it without an Italian declaration of war. The intention was to pin down the Italians while stoking an Ethiopian revolt. There were also skirmishes in the area of Dagguirou and around the lakes Abbe and Ally. The French soon re-occupied it. Anti-aircraft fire was intense and two Italian aircraft failed to return, but fires and explosions were seen in Djibouti. It called for the demilitarisation of Somaliland "for the duration of hostilities between Italy and the British Empire," and granted Italy "full and constant right to use the port of Djibouti with all its equipment, together with the French section of the railway, for all kinds of transport" article 3. The location for the surrender of "all movable arms and ammunition, together with those to be given up to the troops effecting the evacuation of the territory On 28 June, when the Italians demanded that he fulfill certain clauses, he denied all knowledge of any such clauses. Germain arrived at Asmara on 14 July. On the same day, Governor Hubert Deschamps FR was dismissed for his refusal to expel the British consul, with whom he had reached an agreement to supply the colony with food. Germain succeeded him as well, thus becoming the supreme civil and military authority in the colony. When the Italian invasion of British Somaliland began on 3 August, the forces at Loyada moved on Zeila , which they had taken by 5 August. Vichy managed to continue supplying it by submarine from Madagascar , and maintained direct contact by air through flights from France via Greece usually terminating in Madagascar. On 25 September the British bombed Djibouti from the air, prompting Nouailhetas to institute a brutal reign of terror. In May six Africans were shot without trial to set an example to potential deserters. This was labelled Operation Marie. In the end, this plan was dropped, since it was not considered politic to upset the Vichyites at that moment. In March , with Free French forces facing the Vichyite garrison in Somaliland, the British changed their policy to "rally French Somaliland to the Allied cause without bloodshed". The Free French were to arrange a voluntary "rallying" ralliement by means of propaganda while the British were to blockade the colony. Wavell considered that if British pressure was applied, a rally would appear to have been coerced. Wavell preferred to let the propaganda continue and provide a small amount of supplies under strict control. On 1 May Nouailhetas telegraphed Aden to inform the British that he had received permission from Vichy to negotiate. On 8 May General Alan Cunningham responded with his proposals, but no commitments. The suggestion was accepted by the British government but, because of the concessions granted to the Vichy regime in Syria and Lebanon , proposals were made to invade the colony instead. Nouailhetas wrote to Aden on 15 June about the high rate of infant mortality owing to malnutrition in the territory, but he rejected the British terms. All horses, donkeys and camels were consumed, as well as all fresh fruits and vegetables. Beriberi and scurvy spread and many townsfolk left for the desert, leaving their children to be cared for by the Catholic missions. The head doctor at the hospital committed suicide in despair. The Japanese declaration of war 7 December gave the colony some respite, since the British were forced to withdraw all but two ships from the blockade for use in the East. In October

the blockade was reviewed but no changes were implemented before the beginning of the war with Japan. On 2 January , the Vichy government offered the use of the port and railway, subject to the lifting of the blockade, but Britain refused. Some Free French sloops also took part in the bockade. In the end the Americans apologised for this interference.

Across New Zealand, news of the armistice was greeted with joy and celebration on 11 and 12 November. Wellington, according to one newspaper, was turned into a city of boundless joy as wide as the world.

Armistice Day in London was quite different as people, understandably, swarmed through the streets celebrating the end of the war. Swirling crowds, fireworks, bonfires and stolen artillery pieces were the order of the day! The fighting on the Western Front ended at 11 a. News of the Armistice immediately spread through London. Guns were fired to announce the occasion in central London; in Croydon, the air-raid warning maroons were fired, followed by the all-clear bugle calls; the Union Flag was run up the flagpoles of the town hall and churches simultaneously. Taking over a London bus in the Armistice day celebrations, image from battlefield-tours. It was not quite a day universal joy. For some, the thought of what, or whom, they had lost prevented it being a day for celebration. In front of her were two soldiers one with his face horribly scarred. He looked straight ahead and remained stonily silent; the other just bowed his head in his hand and burst out crying. The omnibus conductress dropped into the vacant seat next to Florence, leant her head to her soldier and cried too. The mood of the day, though, was predominantly one of celebration. All across London, crowds gathered in public places. Mayors made speeches from the steps or balconies of their town halls. The festivities were not as extensive beyond Westminster and the West End, but many Londoners had streamed across the capital to be part of that crowd around , are estimated to have taken to the streets to celebrate the Armistice. The celebrations in central London continued every evening for the rest of that week. Thanks perhaps to the still prevailing liquor restrictions, I do not remember myself seeing anybody who appeared to be drunk, although no doubt, like most other rules that week, the Closing Hour Regulations were a good deal disregarded. That night, the whole square was full of people setting off fireworks and crackers. Another bonfire was lit in Piccadilly Circus, fuelled by advertising hoardings from the Pavilion theatre. After the war, the authorities decided that replacing the stone with new pieces would look worse than leaving the original damaged pieces in place. The damage is still visible on the western side of the plinth. On the 13th, a number of German guns went missing. Others were pulled by hand and abandoned nearby; many appeared in Trafalgar Square, one making it as far as Piccadilly Circus. Just before midnight, the gates of Admiralty Arch were closed to try to stop the departure of more of the weapons. Another bonfire was lit in Trafalgar Square, this time near the end of Cockspur Street. Some soldiers fetched another captured German gun, which was again added to the fire while the crowd cheered. In the years after , Armistice Day became increasingly a day for reflection and mourning rather than celebration – particularly once it became obvious that war in Europe had not been banished for ever. On 11 November , though, the mood in London was primarily – and understandably – one of relief and rejoicing for the lifting of the immediate burden of the war.

Today, a grim reminder of World War I comes out from under the shadow of Veterans Day, as it is the centennial of the end of that bloody conflict.

Read This Armistice centenary: Ruffel of the Royal Garrison Artillery recorded in his diary The war is won! During those final hours more than 10, men were killed or wounded. General John Pershing, the commander of the American Expeditionary Force, wanted to continue prosecuting the war to the utmost because he felt “with a certain prophetic insight” that the Allies would otherwise be forced to fight another war against Germany at a later date. He was fatally wounded on August 22 while on patrol near Mons. Private Ellison was killed at am on November 11 on the outskirts of Mons. Their graves face each other. George Price of the Canadian Infantry, who was killed by a German sniper two minutes before the Armistice came into effect, is also buried in St Symphorien. Enniskillen may have been the first community in the British Isles to learn of the impending Armistice. The military barracks in the town picked up a faint radio message at 6. Rockets were immediately launched and church bells started to ring out as crowds gathered in the town for the November hiring fair. In Shrewsbury, Shropshire, as the bells rang out celebrating the Armistice, at noon the Owen family received the cruel telegram announcing the death of their son, Wilfred, not yet recognised as one of the great war poets. He had been killed by machine-gun fire, trying to get his men across the Sambre canal, exactly a week earlier. Carson asked his audience: There was a similar response in all the large mills and factories throughout the city. The Union Flag flew from the tower of the Cathedral in Armagh. Union Flags appeared in great profusion in Portadown. In Comber, Limavady and Portadown factory horns and sirens were sounded. While in many towns people took the day off, in Lisburn people continued to work. A large crowd assembled outside the town hall in Coleraine. Relief was evident on the faces of those assembled in Monaghan, especially on the faces of those with fathers, brothers and sons at the front. The men of the Royal Fusiliers paraded Carrickfergus. A pipe band paraded round Monaghan. In the evening in Portadown every band in the town paraded the streets, followed by large crowds. Dublin was not immune to this enthusiasm. A News Letter special correspondent in Dublin reported:

The armistice ending World War I "a war that changed the world and claimed up to 19 million lives" was signed at 11 a.m. Nov. 11, , in Paris, France. The time here in Loveland was 4 a.m.

Stubby -- War Dog Hero Comment: Stubby, was the most decorated war dog of World War I and the only dog to be promoted to sergeant through combat. One day he appeared at Yale Field in New Haven, Connecticut; while a group of soldiers were training, stopping to make friends with soldiers as they drilled. One soldier, Corporal Robert Conroy, developed a fondness for the dog. He named him Stubby because of his short legs. When it became time for the outfit to ship out, Conroy hid Stubby on board the troop ship. In order to keep the dog, the private taught him to salute his commanding officers warming their hearts to him. Stubby served with the nd Infantry, 26th Yankee Division in the trenches in France for 18 months and participated in four offensives and 18 battles. The loud noise of the bombs and gun fire did not bother him. He was never content to stay in the trenches but went out and found wounded soldiers. Stubby entered combat on February 5, at Chemin Des Dames, north of Soissons, and was under constant fire, day and night for over a month. In April , during a raid to take Schieprey, Stubby was wounded in the foreleg by the retreating Germans throwing hand grenades. He was sent to the rear for convalescence, and as he had done on the front was able to improve morale. When he recovered from his wounds, Stubby returned to the trenches. He was solely responsible for capturing a German spy in the Argonne. The spy made the mistake of speaking German to him when they were alone. Stubby knew he was no ally and attacked him biting and holding on to him by the seat of his pants until his comrades could secure him. Following the retaking of Chateau-Thierry by the US, the thankful women of the town made Stubby a chamois coat on which were pinned his many medals. There is also a legend that while in Paris with Corporal Conroy, Stubby saved a young girl from being hit by a car. At the end of the war, Conroy smuggled Stubby home. After returning home, Stubby became a celebrity and marched in, and normally led, many parades across the country. He would be given the football at halftime and would nudge the ball around the field to the amusement of the fans. In , the Humane Education Society awarded him a special gold medal for service to his country. It was presented by General John Pershing. His remains are featured in The Price of Freedom: Americans at War exhibit at the Smithsonian.
