Readers will appreciate the chapters on finding treatment, paying for mental health care, housing, employment and disability, involuntary hospitalization, the criminal justice system, and links to allies and advocacy groups. The case studies describing a few journeys towards recovery bring hope to the readers. It includes brief descriptions of mental illness symptoms such as hallucinations, delusions, mood swings and other behavior changes, and describes major mental health disorders including schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, depression, anxiety disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder, and borderline personality disorder. The authors use a developmental approach to childhood mental illness, contrasting ordinary childhood patterns with the extreme symptoms that may require intervention. The book suggests using benign, safe parenting techniques that improve structure and reduce stress, and supports a thoughtful approach to initiating treatment. Also covered are developmental disabilities like autism and fetal alcohol syndrome, as well as special education, including individualized education plans IEPs and so-called plans. A chapter on treatment discusses therapy and medication, offering brief notes on various categories of medication. The book emphasizes the need to understand risks and benefits when deciding about any course of treatment. Subsequent sections focus on locating allies to promote recovery, finding resources to support recovery, planning both long-term and short-term, and following the recovery plan. The authors discuss planning for safety in advance of a mental health crisis, responding to a person in crisis, assessing risk of violence, and preventing suicide. The book suggests ways to help people who become involved in the criminal justice system, and covers involuntary hospitalization and guardianship. Further chapters discuss ways to locate treatment, find or retain housing, maintain employment or access vocational rehabilitation services. Disability, Augmentative Communication, and the American Dream is a collaborative effort to tell the life story of Jon A. Feucht, a man who was born with a form of cerebral palsy that left him reliant on a wheelchair for mobility, with limited use of his arms and an inability to speak without an assistive communication device. In the tradition of disability studies, it also illuminates an experience of disability that avoids reading it as tragic or pitiable. Disability, Augmentative Communication, and the American Dream is intended as an analytical and empirical contribution to both disability studies and qualitative sociology, to be read by social science scholars and students taking courses in disability studies and qualitative research, as well as by professionals working in the fields of special education and speech pathology. Written in an accessible style, the book will also be of interest to lay readers who want to learn more about disability issues and the disability experience.

To help celebrate its tenth anniversary, a panel of experts listed its greatest eco-heroes of all time. And it does mean all time: Top of the list is Rachel Carson, a US scientist whose book, *Silent Spring*, is credited by many with kick-starting the modern environmental movement. Her account of the damage caused by the unrestrained industrial use of pesticides provoked controversy and fury in equal measures. Jonathan Porritt, head of the Sustainable Development Commission, is third, with the wildlife broadcaster David Attenborough, fourth. James Lovelock, the UK scientist who developed the Gaia theory of life on earth, is fifth. The US former vice-president turned documentary film maker Al Gore is placed ninth, while David Bellamy, the television botanist who angered some campaigners with his contrary stance on global warming, still makes the list at 10. There are some who have done fantastic things and we wanted to celebrate that. First hired by the US Bureau of Fisheries to write radio scripts during the depression, she supplemented her income writing features on natural history for the *Baltimore Sun*. A year career in the federal service as a scientist and editor followed from 1935, and she rose to editor in chief of all publications for the US Fish and Wildlife Service. In 1945 she resigned to focus on writing, and published a prize-winning study of the ocean, *The Sea Around Us*, followed by *The Edge of the Sea* in 1955. Essentially a biography of the ocean, the books made Carson famous as a naturalist and science writer. Disturbed by the widespread use of synthetic chemical pesticides after the second world war, she switched focus and wrote *Silent Spring*. The book is credited with launching the concept of the environment as a system that sustains us and that we must learn to live within, rather than a mine, dump or playground. It infuriated government and industrial interests and she was attacked by lobbyists as an alarmist. She died in 1964 after a long battle against breast cancer. He was feted by alternative circles in the 1970s for unorthodox thinking, and his opposition to nuclear power and the use of chemicals in agriculture. He was an early critic of economic growth as a measure of national progress and helped to found the Soil Association. Small is Beautiful catapulted him to international attention: He died in 1992. He gave up teaching in 1970 to lead Friends of the Earth. In 1980 he helped to found Forum for the Future. Tony Blair made him head of the Sustainable Development Commission in 1999, but he remains a critic of government policy on nuclear power and in 2006 urged the prime minister to "bang heads" across departments to combat greenhouse gas emissions. He irked some activists with his book *Capitalism As If The World Matters*, in which he argued that environmentalists must embrace a "evolved, intelligent and elegant" form of capitalism. His programmes have brought the natural world into the living rooms of millions over 50 years and his contribution to public awareness of natural science brought him a fellowship of the Royal Society. The idea was hugely influential among fellow scientists and environmentalists, and religious and spiritual thinkers. An ex-Nasa scientist, his work on the Viking Mars missions sparked an interest in the way planets function. More recently he courted controversy by public supporting nuclear power and increasingly dire predictions on the consequences of climate change for the human race. His book *The Revenge of Gaia* predicts that billions will die by the end of the century, with survivors forced to live in the Arctic. He argues that the phrase "global warming" fails to reflect the seriousness of the problem and wants it replaced with "global heating". The movement has since planted more than 10m trees to prevent soil erosion and provide firewood for cooking fires. Most have been planted by poor women in the villages of Kenya, restoring their environment and providing paid work. Jailed several times by previous administrations, she was elected to parliament in 2005 and is now environment minister. Last year he spoke out on climate change, calling it the greatest challenge to face man. His utopian view of a society in harmony with nature still inspires generations of sustainable-living advocates. At the International Institute for Environment and Development he was instrumental in bringing together the poverty and environment agendas. He says soft technologies can cut energy use by three-quarters. She has had a vast impact on a range of issues from forest conservation to GM crops, from world trade policy to organic farming. His most recent book, *Hidden Systems: A Science for Sustainable Living*, argues the need for a natural rather than a technical

toolkit to tackle the impending global crisis. His writings on conservation and the value of the wild to civilisation are highly regarded. The most famous, *A Sand County Almanac*, inspired many to follow in his footsteps. He was murdered by ranchers opposed to his activism.
