Chapter 1 : North Toledo Bend State Park | Louisiana Office of State Parks

The Ebarb and Toledo Bend area of Louisiana has a fascinating and colorful history. Founded in , the French Fort St. Jean Baptiste was the first settlement in the area, followed soon after by the Spanish Fort Los Adaes.

Somewhere down the years the "Y" became "E", as it is pronounced in English, and the "O" was dropped. Adaes was the capital of Texas and had a stable population. Civil officials had brought their families and built homes. Upon retirement from office, the men often set up businesses in the town or opened farms and ranches nearby. The population numbered about 5,, mostly Spanish, although there were a generous sprinkling of French and several Caddo Indians in the settlement. The Treaty of Paris, in which France ceded Louisiana to Spain, disrupted this idyllic scene and rendered the border post obsolete. The journey began on March His family consisted of an aged mother and several grown children. Most of the inhabitants prepared to emigrate, but a number fled to the forest. About 34 men, who had married French girls from the nearby settlement of Natchitoches, moved their families into the French settlement. The military commandeered many of the horses, so a host of civilians had to walk, which added greatly to their distress under the burning summer sun. When the caravan reached his ranch, 34 persons, including his mother, his sister and sister-in-law, were granted permission to remain there. It was one of these people who established a settlement called Vallecillo, meaning "little valley" which was corrupted to Bayou Scie. It became the present day Ebarb. Ann Church in Ebarb, Louisiana. During the 25th anniversary year of the Diocese of Shreveport we are profiling small churches around the diocese. Ann houses a robust place of worship in Ebarb, a small area of homes at the western edge of Sabine parish. According to Ione Durr, a granddaughter of Homer Ezernack who was one of the four carpenters, a mule-drawn wagon load of materials arrived each week on Monday from Zwolle with the head carpenter who boarded with the Albert Ebarb family. Friday, he would drive the mules back to Zwolle. The church looks very much the same today with the exception of a stunning altar piece brought to Ebarb from Iowa by Fr. A front porch has been added, a wing for housing a resident priest was completed in the early s and the St. Ann cemetery was created just down the road on the way to Zwolle. But when Toledo Bend came in, so many people had to move and now there is just the one road into the community from Zwolle. Mass was said by Fr. Bokhoven when he could get to Ebarb from St. Joseph much like Fr. Tim Hurd serves the parish today. Beginning as a mission of St. Joseph Church in Zwolle, seven miles away, St. Ann was returned to mission status in after 50 years as an independent parish. Early parishioners await Mass inside St. Ann although I think Confirmation may have been at St. William Pierce, the resident pastor at St. Ann from , is shown motoring up a waterway in a small boat filled with eight school-aged children as he ferries them to the parish for religion classes. A couple of the smaller boys are holding onto the gunnels fiercely but most are smiling. The children in the photograph have last names that are still very common in the community: A more contemporary photograph on page 14 of that same publication shows a group of 11 youngsters, all decked out in canvas-covered life jackets, waiting by an all-terrain vehicle. Any time Mass was being held, she was there with her passengers no matter the weather. She also remembers when air conditioning and a P. Ann Cemetery is on the left as one drives into the center of the community. Luis Antlitz is buried in the cemetery under the main cross. He served as pastor from through , then retired. Today, the community gathers at St. Ann Church for Mass on Saturday evenings at 6: Anita Manshack unlocks the main door around 6: Among the early arrivals is Nicolette Ebarb and her cousin, Crista Chance, who go out onto the front porch to begin greeting parishioners. And then we ring the bell. There are big crowds here at Christmas and Easter plus there are newcomers, the visitors who are fishing or camping on the lake.
