welcome to cub scouting: earning the tiger rank A child who is 7 years old or is in the first grade is a Tiger, and their adventures are found in the Tiger Handbook. A 7 year old or child in the first grade joins Cub Scouting with their parent or adult guardian.

When he has learned these, he gets his Tiger Cub emblem, which is a tiger paw with four strings for beads. He wears the emblem on his right pocket. When the boy has earned five beads of each color, he can receive his Tiger Cub badge. Then, during a grand ceremony, the adult gives the badge to the boy. Tiger Cub Requirements When a boy is in the first grade, he works on the Tiger Cub badge with his adult partner. When he has accomplished these tasks, he may begin working on the 15 achievement requirements to earn Tiger Cub rank. These simple requirements, to be completed with the adult partners, include a family activity, Den activity, and Go See It Den outing in five achievement areas. When the Tiger Cub has completed the 15 achievement requirements, he receives his Tiger Cub badge in a ceremony during a monthly pack meeting. After earning the Tiger Cub badge, the boy is encouraged to work on the numerous elective activities in his book. The boy is also encouraged to begin working on the requirements for his Bobcat badge. When he completes 10 electives, he earns a Tiger Track bead that is worn on the Tiger Cub belt totem. There is no limit to the number of Tiger Track beads that a boy may earn; however, each Tiger Track bead must represent the completion of 10 elective projects. Remember to always refer to the most current published copy of the Bear Handbook for all requirements. Learn the Cub Scout Motto: Do Your Best 2. Learn the Cub Scout Sign 3. Making My Family Special 2. Where I Live 3. Keeping Myself Healthy and Safe 4. How I Tell It 5. Remember, there are NO performance requirements for a boy. Discover how family life was the same and how it was different many years ago. Ask someone who works there how he or she helps people in your community. With your family, plan a fire drill then practice it in your home. With your adult partner, plan what to do if you became lost or separated from your family in a strange place. After earning the Lion rank, additional optional Lion elective adventures can be done for further exploration and fun: The first page in the Lion Adventure Book can be used by the Lion to track progress all in one place by adding stickers given by the Lion Guide. Some scouts strive to earn the remaining seven adventure stickers. An energetic, experienced, and caring Lion Guide is important to the success of a Lion Den. The Guide plans the program of activities for the year and makes that plan available to all the adult partners. But, the guide does not organize and run every den meeting and outing, instead the actual running of the program is done through shared leadership with the adult partners. A Lion Den relies on the support and enthusiasm of its families! This shared leadership helps ensure participation by all, provides a sense of ownership to all, and gives each scout family a chance to lead the den. Every Lion Den is required to have a registered leader whose responsibilities are: Work directly with other den and pack leaders to ensure that their den is an active and successful part of the pack. Plan and prepare for initial Lion den meeting and outing. Mentor adult partners in the delivery of their particular den meetings. Lead the den at the monthly meeting and pack activities. Ensure the transition of scouts in the Lion den into a Tiger den at the end of the year. Prepare Lions for day camp at the end of the Lion year. Coordinate shared leadership among the Lion adult partners, ensuring that each Lion and adult partner get to be the host team to plan and execute the den activities. The most valuable resource available to help the Lion Guide plan and run a successful, interesting program for the scouts is the Lion Parent and Leader Guidebook. It has an explanation of the program and how it works, den meeting plans for all adventures, and many ideas for activities that promote the purposes of Cub Scouting, and that Lions will enjoy. Keep in mind that participation is the key goal of the Lion program. There is no level of competence or skill required to earn the rank badge. This information is intended to make Lion dens more productive and interesting for the scouts. A cub scout at the Lion level needs a lot of activity made up of short, interesting games, projects, and challenges.
