Why is the resurrection of Jesus Christ important? The resurrection of Jesus is important for several reasons. First, the resurrection witnesses to the immense power of God Himself. To believe in the resurrection is to believe in God. If God exists, and if He created the universe and has power over it, then He has power to raise the dead. If He does not have such power, He is not worthy of our faith and worship. Only He who created life can resurrect it after death, only He can reverse the hideousness that is death itself, and only He can remove the sting and gain the victory over the grave 1 Corinthians In resurrecting Jesus from the grave, God reminds us of His absolute sovereignty over life and death. The resurrection of Jesus Christ is also important because it validates who Jesus claimed to be, namely, the Son of God and Messiah. The resurrection of Jesus Christ, attested to by hundreds of eyewitnesses 1 Corinthians Another reason the resurrection of Jesus Christ is important is that it proves His sinless character and divine nature. If Jesus Christ is not resurrected, then we have no hope that we will be, either. There is no resurrection apart from Christ, no eternal life. Jesus confers His life on those who trust in Him, so that we can share His triumph over death 1 John 5: We who believe in Jesus Christ will personally experience resurrection because, having the life Jesus gives, we have overcome death. It is impossible for death to win 1 Corinthians In other words, Jesus led the way in life after death. The resurrection of Jesus Christ is important as a testimony to the resurrection of human beings, which is a basic tenet of the Christian faith. Unlike other religions, Christianity possesses a Founder who transcends death and promises that His followers will do the same. Every other religion was founded by men or prophets whose end was the grave. As Christians, we know that God became man, died for our sins, and was resurrected the third day. The grave could not hold Him. He lives, and He sits today at the right hand of the Father in heaven Hebrews Such assurance results in a great song of triumph as Paul writes in 1 Corinthians Where, O death, is your sting? The importance of the resurrection of Christ has an impact on our service to the Lord now. Paul ends his discourse on resurrection with these words: Let nothing move you. Because of the resurrection of Jesus Christ, thousands of Christian martyrs through history have willingly traded their earthly lives for everlasting life and the promise of resurrection. The resurrection is the triumphant and glorious victory for every believer. Jesus Christ died, was buried, and rose the third day according to the Scriptures 1 Corinthians And He is coming again! The dead in Christ will be raised up, and those who are alive at His coming will be changed and receive new, glorified bodies 1 Thessalonians 4: It proves who Jesus is. It shows that God has the power to raise us from the dead. It guarantees that the bodies of those who believe in Christ will not remain dead but will be resurrected unto eternal life.

The crowd mocked Jesus by putting a crown of thorns on His head and a sign above His head that read: King of the Jews. They told Him to come down and save Himself. Jesus could have called down a legion of angels, but He suffered, bled and died to save humanity. Jesus was between two thieves on the cross. Dying by crucifixion on the cross was not just for Jesus. It was the capital punishment at that time. Jesus told him, "Today, you will be with me in paradise. The first three expressions were for the people. Jesus turned the attention to Himself only at the fourth statement. Noon - "The Sixth Hour" Darkness covered the land. When Jesus was born at night, it became light. When He died during the day, it became dark for three hours from the sixth to the ninth hour. In other words, it was from noon to mid-afternoon around 3 p. Jesus cries out to the Father. Jesus says, "I thirst. The legs of the thieves were broken so they would die. Jesus died on the cross without His legs being broken. That was to fulfill the prophecy that His bones would not be broken. The centurion said, "Surely, he was the Son of God! It was taken down from the cross and laid in the tomb of the Pharisee. The large stone was laid in front of the tomb and soldiers guarded the entrance to the tomb. The Resurrection Jesus was in the grave only three days. He rose on the third day just as He said He would. The resurrection account appears in all four of the gospels and in the book of Acts.

He received the wrath we deserved; the Sinless One dying for the sinful ones Rom 3: We were saved by His sinless perfection while living in the flesh here on earth, but also saved by His death. We had to be quickened by the Spirit of God to be resurrected Eph 2: So just as in Adam, we all die, so also in Christ, these same shall be made alive 1st Cor We are saved by His life; we are saved by His death, but what about the resurrection? Are we saved by that too? Saved by His Resurrection Baptism is a great symbol of the death of the old man or woman. They are plunged beneath the water, as in a watery grave, but then raised up out of the water, just as we shall come up from our graves, and then in body and soul be with the Lord forever. If we have died with Him we needed a resurrection , but Jesus has already been raised from the dead and is the captain of our salvation, the trailblazer of the first born or preeminent one of the brothers and sisters. Chapter 4 : Why is the resurrection of Jesus Christ important?

Death and Resurrection The climax of Jesus' story - his death and resurrection - becomes central to evolving Christian faith. But, each gospel tells it differently.

Figuring out when Jesus ate the Last Supper with his disciples and which day he died on the cross is not easy. First of all, Jews started new days each evening! Our days in the Gregorian calendar begin and end in the middle of the night and consider daylight the middle of the day. Jewish days began at dusk with the first half of a day being the dark night and the second half of the day being the daylight. But Jesus said he would be in the grave for 3 nights. So either Jesus is wrong see matthew Review the visual timeline below that reconciles Jewish days with our Gregorian calendar. We must explore ancient Jewish expressions, Passover customs, and the Feast of Unleavened Bread to see a clearer picture of when Jesus died and was buried. Passover in Jewish Homes. Most people observed Passover in their homes on Wednesday evening as Nisan 14 began. But Priests celebrated Passover by sacrificing the Korban Pesach in the Temple on Thursday afternoon as Nisan 14 ended with the close of daylight. Jesus Ate And Died on Passover. Jesus Died on Thursday. Gospels Use Different Clocks. Leviticus 23 says the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread was a special high Sabbath on Nisan 15 regardless of the day of the week it fell on. Burial Before the Special Sabbath. Resurrection After Both Sabbaths. So Jesus rose on the day of the Firstfruits, and Paul explains the theological significance in 1 Corinthians Jesus was the first of many more resurrections to come. By combining the various gospels' accounts Jesus' death and resurrection, one can develop a common story that is consistent with most of the Biblical texts: Simon from Cyrene was pressed into service to carry the cross from Jerusalem to Golgatha, the place of crucifixion.

We discuss His birth, including His eternal existence, Virgin Birth, and fulfillment of prophecy. The summary of His life describes His baptism, temptation, teaching, and the evidence for His claims. We conclude with a study of His betrayal, trials, death by crucifixion, burial, resurrection, and ascension. Two of our best-loved hymns talk about "telling the story" of Jesus. One is entitled "Tell Me the Story of Jesus. And Jesus is the central theme of the Bible. So everyone needs to hear the story of Jesus. One of the songs says: Another verse in the song says: We need to be reminded of the evidence on which our faith is based Rom. And preaching Jesus is not just preaching about things He did. Preaching Jesus includes preaching what He taught, including the teachings He inspired His apostles and prophets to teach. In short the entire New Testament is the story of Jesus. But the focus of this study will emphasize what Jesus did and who He is. We will use the verses of "Tell Me the Story of Jesus" to outline of our main points. The questions I hope you will ask yourself as we study are: And 2 Do you love to tell the story of Jesus? If so, how diligent are you in telling it to others? Do you seek opportunities to talk to people about the gospel of Christ? He Existed from Eternity the Creator. He existed from eternity with God the Father and the Holy Spirit. His eternal nature Micah 5: This passage is applied to Jesus in Matt. He was born in Bethlehem, but He existed from eternity. Not only did Jesus exist from eternity, but He is the eternal Creator of all created things. If Jesus made everything that was created, then He Himself must not have been created. He is eternal - the eternal Cause of all that exists. So, the first thing to know about Jesus is that His life on earth was not the beginning of His existence. He existed from eternity with the Heavenly Father, and He was, in fact, the eternal Creator of the entire universe. He Left Heaven to Live on Earth. He emptied Himself to live on earth as a man, and humbled Himself even to the point of dying on the cross 2 Corinthians 8: As a result of this sacrifice, we can become rich. Jesus had the glory and privileges of being honored as Deity in Heaven. But He gave that up that honor to come to earth to live as a man. Deity took the place of man - God in the flesh. We will see why as we proceed. The promise to Abraham Genesis God planned from before Jesus was ever born, that His coming would bless every nation of people on earth in fulfillment of a fundamental Divine promise. The Old Testament frequently predicted the coming of the kingdom that would be subject to this Anointed Ruler the Messiah or Christ Dan. By right of inheritance, Jesus deserved to rule as King. We will learn more of this as we proceed. He Was Born of a Virgin. Some people today deny the Virgin Birth. She did not understand, since she had no relations with a man; so, the angel explained that this would occur by the power of the Holy Spirit. An angel assured Joseph that this had occurred by the power of God, not as an act of immorality; so Joseph proceeded to take her as wife. God brought Jesus into the world by a miracle. At the very beginning of His earthly existence, God used a supernatural event to prove that Jesus was no ordinary man. His conception and birth by a woman shows His human nature. His conception by the Holy Spirit Deity , without a human father, shows He is not just human but is also Divine. The nature of man and the nature of God were united in Jesus. He Was Born in Humble Circumstances. Though He came to be a King and was in fact the Eternal Creator, yet Jesus was born and lived in the most humble of circumstances. This miraculous event also proved the special character of the One who was born. Do you believe this story to be true? Do you love to tell the story to others? What efforts have you made to give others the opportunity to hear and believe? We will concentrate on just a few events that demonstrate His character and His purpose for coming. The gospel teaches that we today need to be baptized to receive remission of sins Acts 2: But Jesus had no sins to be forgiven, so He was not baptized for the same reason as us. So, we might also think that God does not understand us but just sits in an ivory tower making rules. But by living, suffering, and dying as a man, Jesus assures us that God does understand and cares about us. But though Jesus is a separate individual, yet the Father and the Holy Spirit affirmed their unity with Jesus and their approval of Him. The miraculous voice of the Father and the miraculous appearance of the Spirit

constitute Divine proof that Jesus was the Son of God. His Temptation Matthew 4: Satan then came to tempt Him. Jesus answered every temptation saying, "It is written. There is always a way of escape, so there is never an excuse for sin. Jesus lived a sinless life. Though Satan tried repeatedly to defeat Him, Jesus overcame every time. Though we have sinned and need forgiveness, this was never true of Jesus. His life set an example and a goal for us to strive for: Again, this shows that God understands what we go through when we face temptation. Jesus was the only man ever to live without committing even one sin, so He is the only one who truly deserves to be counted righteous before God. Later we will see that this sinless life was necessary for Him to be a perfect sacrifice for our sins. They were the absolute will of God. Jesus came as God in the flesh to reveal a message to man from God. He has the words of eternal life. No one can come to the Father except by Him. We must accept and obey them, both because they come from God, and because they show us the only way to receive eternal life. No one should say he believes in Jesus but sees no need to follow His teachings. But all truth would be revealed to the apostles through the Holy Spirit. The result is that the written word we have in the New Testament today constitutes the very commands of Jesus Himself. To be truly wise, we must both hear and do what Jesus taught. He who believes and is baptized will be saved. But he who disbelieves will be condemned. Those who truly believe in Jesus must not only believe in His miraculous birth and sinless life, they must also believe that He was the Son of God and a Divine spokesman from God. And we must recognize our need to believe and obey His teachings as the only way to receive eternal life. His teachings are revealed for us in the Scriptures. His Evidence How do we know that the claims made about Jesus in the Bible are really true? Anyone can claim to come from God or to speak for God. What proof is there? From the many proofs available, we will consider just two categories. Jesus fulfilled Old Testament prophecy. Claims that Jesus fulfilled prophecy Luke Men can predict the distant future in detail only if God guides them. So, we should listen to His message. The most important of the miracles that occurred was His resurrection from the dead. If Jesus really arose from the dead, that would be amazing. But even more amazing is the fact that His resurrection was predicted ahead of time.

One reason people might not understand all the details because no single gospel gives an inclusive account of Jesus' death, burial and resurrection even though all four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John cover a particular part of the events.

Before beginning, read the Resurrection accounts in the Gospels. Try looking at them as for the first time. What happened here that prompted these stories? Look for differences as well as similarities. How reliable are the Gospel accounts of the resurrection? What do they tell us about what really happened? How are we to understand the differences? Is there a clear resurrection message? The Synoptic Problem Even a casual reader will notice that the first three gospels -- Matthew, Mark, and Luke -- have many verbal similarities, while the fourth gospel seems quite different. Because they have so much common material, the first three gospels are termed the Synoptic Gospels. The word "synoptic" comes from two Greek words syn-, "together" and opsesthai, "to see". It means "presenting or taking the same or common view. Scholars have a name for this hypothetical source; they call it Q, which stands for the German word Quelle, meaning "source. Obviously each gospel writer told the story with a particular editorial purpose in mind. As an eyewitness, John wrote from his own mature perspective of what Jesus said and did and intended. When you compare the gospels you see some minor differences here and there. We may not understand the reasons for these differences; we just accept them and let the scholars spin their complex theories. Resurrection Differences The gospel accounts are similar, but each is different. Perhaps the last page was lost. Verses were added by the early church because it seemed strange that Mark ended abruptly as it did. When you compare each of the stories, you can find a number of differences. In the Synoptic Gospels, Mary Magdalene and other women go to the tomb. Appearance to the women. In Mark, the women tell no one of what they had seen. In Matthew and Mark one angel appears; in Luke and John there are two angels. In Matthew they go to "look at" the tomb. See the discussion below. Most of these differences are minor and can be explained or harmonized rather easily. When you think about it, you realize that these very differences validate the authenticity of the story. If all the eyewitnesses agree in every detail, a good investigator begins to suspect collusion between the witnesses before testifying. The Church has been aware of these minor differences in the resurrection accounts for many centuries. Some might express concern with how this might affect our doctrine of the authority of scripture 2 Timothy 3: But surely our understanding of the inspiration of scripture must be large enough to encompass the gospel accounts as we find them. Rather than seeing these accounts as evidence of error, the Church has viewed them as evidence of authenticity, representing various eyewitness traditions that are remarkably united on the main points. What differences do you find between the various resurrection accounts? How do you account for differences in eyewitness testimony? How might these differences add to the credibility of the witnesses?

Chapter 7 : Jesus's™ Death, Burial, and Resurrection - Truth For The World

The Gospel of Luke retells the story of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. The companion to the Gospel account Luke wrote was Acts, which retells the work of Jesus' spirit after his ascension, and the story of the movement of people he inspired.

What have you been thinking about? In particular we will consider the women at the tomb, the dilemma of the guards, the scheming of the priests, the implications of grave robbing, the credibility of the story and the final encounter at Galilee. The Women verses 1-10 Forty years ago, J. Phillips, a famous translator of the New Testament into contemporary English, wrote an influential little book called *The Ring of Truth*. In it he collected numerous examples of surprising details in the documents, which he contended could only have been included because they were true. The involvement of women as the principal witnesses on that Easter Sunday morning is a typical example. It seems strange to us, but in first century Jewish society women were not accepted as being as reliable as male witnesses. The Rabbis taught that their testimony should only be considered if no males had seen the events in question. Yet here we have Matthew writing as a Jew and particularly for Jewish readers. If this was fictional, it is difficult to imagine why women should be the central witnesses to that pivotal event. Their testimony would seriously weaken the story. Surely the Gospel writers included them only because they were there. That is the way it was. By the same token, Paul, writing his formal list of witnesses to the resurrection in 1 Corinthians 15, does not mention them. Female witnesses would do nothing to strengthen the case. Matthew, however, tells us Matthew The earthquake Matthew Now this stunning apparition enters the scene. Incidentally, Luke says there were two angels Luke Such discrepancies should not faze us. Rather, they suggest that there was no collusion or attempt to bring the stories into line. Every jury smells a rat when the witnesses give exactly the same story. Here Luke records that Peter ran to the tomb; John adds that he ran with him; Mark and Matthew omit these details. Mark and Luke tell of two disciples who met Jesus while walking in the country; Matthew and John omit that. If there were two angels at the tomb, then Matthew was certainly right to mention one, so neither statement is intrinsically false. The angel rolls back the stone and sits on it. Interestingly, we are told nothing about the actual resurrection of Jesus. He has, it seems, already risen. Rather, he opens the tomb to let them in. We read in verse 6: The arrival of the angel shook the guards witless and terrified the women. Mark and Luke say that the women took spices with them to anoint the body. They clearly had not been expecting anything else to happen. The angel tried to reassure them and sent them off to tell the disciples to meet the risen Jesus in Galilee. I suspect the women dropped the spices! The angel told them to go quickly, but why did they run? Students of physiology will know the answer to that. Adrenaline is the hormone that is released for fright, fight and flight. If you are severely shaken, the desire to run is instinctive and very effective in reducing adrenaline levels and relieving stress. Exercise is good therapy for the anxious. Suddenly the women met Jesus, their fear being all too apparent. So he further tells them not to be afraid and confirms the message of the angel about the rendezvous in Galilee. Matthew adds the important detail that this was no apparition or vision or flight of fantasy. This resurrection was not purely spiritual, for they physically clasped his feet. The Guards verses 11-15 The scene now moves to the other witnesses to the story, the guards. Having recovered from their profound shock verse 4 , the guards went off to report the matter to the Chief Priests. Pilate had given permission for the deployment of the Guard, so these were probably Roman soldiers. His permission would not have been required for a deployment of the Jewish Temple guard. But reporting back to Pilate raised real difficulties: To admit to such bungling incompetence, compounded by a story of such total improbability, would not go well for them. It could well have cost them their lives. So they go instead to the chief priests. Just how cunning was this plan? It constituted a complete volte-face. Now they promote it as their best option. It was not going to be easy. If the guards feared for their lives, persuading them to use the excuse that they were asleep was hardly going to help their cause. It required a sufficient sum of money to bribe them verse 12 bribery being the popular technique for getting what you wanted in that world along with strong reassurances that the chief priests would speak up for the guards and keep them out of trouble verse

There were also intrinsic improbabilities about the idea that the guards slept through the noise of the tomb being opened and robbed; and being so deeply asleep, they still knew it was the disciples who did it. This was not going to be an easy story to tell! As a general rule, it is of course easier to be truthful than to lie, because fabrications create even greater difficulties. This lie, which was evidently told for years to come, inadvertently bears witness to the unassailable truth which they would have been reluctant to admit otherwise that the body of Christ was not available to be able finally and comprehensively to refute the resurrection story. All they needed to do to stop the claim in its tracks was to produce the body. Everyone – the Roman soldiers, the Jewish Elders and the Christian disciples – were now all singing from the same song sheet; the one thing they all agreed upon is that the corpse had gone missing. Rigor mortis sets in shortly after death and lasts for some 24 hours, and longer in a cool environment. I have some experience of this. As a GP, I have had to examine bodies at the Undertakers prior to a cremation. I find I cannot even push a body onto its side without help. Corpses are very difficult to manhandle. Trying to move a corpse usually requires two people. To take a corpse any distance requires several people. Usually four or six people carry a coffin into church, for instance. Then there is the problem of disposal of the body. Murderers are driven to great lengths to accomplish this, and even then the body is usually found. If they try to bury it, the grave is usually too shallow. Some have tried dissolving the body in acid; others have chopped the body into pieces and thrown it into a lake. This body was apparently lost without trace. Here, then, we have a scenario which would require several witnesses to the crime, all of whom take their secret to their graves, despite the phenomenal rumpus occurring by large numbers of people fraudulently claiming that they had seen Jesus alive after death. How come nobody broke rank and spoke up or even left an anonymous diagram to say where the body could be found? Modern Sceptics It comes as a surprise to modern sceptics that anything intelligent can be said years after the event to defend the claim that Jesus rose from the dead. However, the passage of time in itself does not weaken the evidence. The evidence is dependent on the time lapse between the events themselves and the recorded witness statements. The force of that evidence does not then weaken over the years, apart from the inability to interrogate the witnesses. The more the story is studied, the more perplexing it becomes. There are of course, two quite separate matters that have to be resolved. Firstly, a plausible explanation is required to account for the empty tomb and the missing body. Secondly, some credible explanation is required to account for the experiences of all those people who claimed to have met the risen Christ. Illusions and hallucinations do not fit the picture at all. Paul tells us in the oldest account, that this list included people at one time 1 Corinthians Given the enormous numbers of people, who became convinced of this story from the outset, some such number would be required. We can briefly consider a typical example. Some have postulated that Jesus recovered in the cool of the tomb and escaped while the guards slept. The problems with this are many. Firstly, we are assured he was dead before being taken down from the cross, hence the spear in his side. John Roman soldiers were all too expert at the work of crucifixion – they had plenty of practice – and were too fearful of the consequences if they made a bad job of it. Even if he was alive, without First Aid to stem the blood flow and a drink to replace his fluid loss, it is difficult to imagine how he could recover from such physical extremis. Then to postulate that he found enough strength to remove the stone just when the guards – all of them – were in complete dereliction of duty by being deeply asleep, increases the implausibility. You then have to suppose this dying man so appeared to his disciples that they thought he was resurrected. We are not told how he got to Galilee on pierced feet.

Chapter 8 : Why The Gospel Includes Jesus's™ Life, Death And Resurrection

The Gospel: Christ's Death and Resurrection One of the most unforgettable experiences that Sandy and I have had in our travels is watching the "processions" during Holy Week (Semana Santa) in Spain.

By means of His resurrection, Jesus proved He had power over death. This assures us that if we truly trust and obey Jesus, He will one day raise us from the dead also. The death, burial, and resurrection of our Lord are the very foundation of the Gospel by which we are saved 1 Corinthians Jesus was led out of the city to be crucified Hebrews He needed help to bear the heavy cross. Simon, a Cyrenian, was forced to help Him. A great crowd followed Jesus to the place where He was crucified. Among them were the Jewish leaders who had demanded His death. Luke mentions the women who followed Jesus. They were the last to leave the cross and the first to come to His grave on the morning of His resurrection. His disciples also followed, but from a distance. Jesus was taken to a hill called Golgotha, the place of the skull. Here the Son of God was nailed to a cross. On either side of Him were crucified thieves. This fulfilled the prophecy Isaiah had made years before, and he was numbered with the transgressors Isaiah Not content with having brought about His crucifixion, the leaders of the Jews mocked Jesus. The Roman soldiers also mocked Him as did the thieves who were crucified with Him. However, one of them repented. He knew Jesus was innocent. He asked the Lord to remember him when He came in His kingdom. Jesus replied, Today shalt thou be with me in Paradise Luke Darkness came over all the land for three hours when Jesus died. The great veil in the temple which separated the holy place from the most holy place was torn in two. Saints who were dead arose from their graves and walked about the city Matthew Joseph, a wealthy man from Arimathea, asked permission from Pilate to bury the body of Jesus in his own new tomb where no body had ever lain before. This fulfilled another prophecy of Isaiah, And they made his grave with the wicked, and with a rich man in his death Isaiah Jesus was buried on Friday before the Jewish sabbath began at sunset Luke His body remained in the grave throughout Saturday. On Sunday morning, the first day of the week , He arose from the dead! When the faithful women came with spices to anoint the body of Jesus, they found the tomb empty. Angels announced to them the wonderful news that Jesus had arisen from the dead. They took the good news to the apostles Luke Peter ran to the tomb and saw for himself that the Lord had indeed risen from the dead. The Gospel of Jesus Christ is good news because it provides forgiveness of sins, restores fellowship with God, gives hope in death, and the promise of eternal life. In order for one to receive these blessings, he must die to sin and arise to walk in newness of life. This is done when one obeys the Gospel of Jesus Christ Romans 6: Dear friend, have you obeyed the Gospel? If you have not, you are lost in your sins. Why not obey the Gospel today so that you can have everlasting life?

Chapter 9 : Timeline of Jesus' Death, Burial and Resurrection | Owlcation

The resurrection of Jesus or resurrection of Christ is the Christian religious belief that, after being put to death, Jesus rose again from the dead: as the Nicene Creed expresses it, "On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures".

There were many defining moments in the life of Jesus. Two of them were his baptism by John the Baptist, and his crucifixion by the Roman authorities. But they differ greatly when describing the events before his baptism and after his death. Some liberal theologians have concluded that the birth , childhood and resurrection stories were pieced together by the authors of the gospels out of developing legends that were circulating among various Christian groups at the time. Conservative theologians believe in the inerrancy of the Bible and that God inspired its authors. Thus they believe that the apparently conflicting gospel stories can be harmonized into a single coherent picture. Details of the death and resurrection of Jesus are described in the following Gospel passages: Simon from Cyrene was pressed into service to carry the cross from Jerusalem to Golgatha, the place of crucifixion. There, Jesus was offered a drink of wine mixed with a bitter substance. He was nailed to the cross through his palms and feet. Two robbers were crucified with him; one on either side. People passing by hurled insults. From the 6th to the 9th hour, it became dark. He was offered vinegar to drink. He cried out again and died. The gospels record different final messages. The veil in the temple was torn from top to bottom by an unknown force. He wrapped the body in a clean linen cloth, placed it in the tomb and sealed the entrance. On Sunday morning, an unknown number of women came to the tomb. The stone had been rolled away. But not all of the gospels totally agree with this story.
