The thing is culture baits us to go as far as we want to and then chastises and punishes us when we go too far. Most of our regrets come from sex or money. When people come to me for help it is usually about sex or money. Today I am going to deal with money. They ignore what the Bible has to say about money. The reason the Bible speaks so much about money has nothing to do with money. It has to do with your devotion. If you do we need to talk. No, the real struggle is do I surrender myself to Him. Or do I depend on my own wealth and knowledge to get me through. Lets look at what Jesus has to say about this in the Sermon on the Mount. There is a tension here. God wants you and he knows his greatest competition is your money or your stuff. You cannot have two masters. God is the master you need but stuff gets in the way if we are not careful. How much would it take for us to have enough money? Remarkably, studies show that most people, regardless of income, answer the question the same way: Both of these are self centered and have you living as if there is no God.
