See also Ramona Quimby , which takes place in the same neighborhood, and serves as its Sequel Series. Henry is not averse with hanging out with girls, but he does frequently react with disgust if he sees Mary Jane act particularly girly. Ribsby hates water and would struggle and yelp and whine if Henry tries to give him a bath. Beezus is actually named Beatrice, but almost nobody calls her that. Jerk with a Heart of Gold: But he usually shares his good stuffs with the others, and can be a dependable friend if need be. He goes with Henry, of course. My Hair Came Out Green: In the first book, Henry wanted to enter Ribsby into a dog competition, but Ribsby got himself muddy on their way to the park. Not having the time to bathe him, Henry tries to cover up the dirt patches with white powder since Ribsby is partially white , and is horrified to find out that the powder is pink. Nothing Exciting Ever Happens Here: Most of the books would open with Henry getting bored with his life, then follows the funny shenanigans that he encounters when he finally found something interesting to pursue. In The Paper Route, Henry purchased 4 kittens from a garage sale. Ribsby develops friendship with a particularly lively black cat and the family ended up keeping it, while donating the rest to the pet shop. But, after completing 2 years of her junior college, Cleary enrolled herself at the California University in Berkeley, from where she earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in the subject of English in While studying at the university, she also came across her husband named Clarence Cleary. Due to the disapproval of her relationship with Clarence, author Cleary ran away and got married to him in the year After some time, she began struggling to find enough books that she would suggest to the children. Cleary even believed that the children deserve good quality books to read, and it is the duty of the librarians to encourage them to select and read the appropriate books. Eventually, author Cleary wrote her first novel titled Henry Higgins in , which was followed by other books and series, featuring her popular characters.
