Students should look for the answers to the questions in their W column. Students can fill out their L columns either during or after reading. L Column Suggestions In addition to answering the W column questions, encourage students to write in the L column anything they found especially interesting. To distinguish between the answers to their questions and the ideas they found interesting, have students code the information in their L columns. For example, they can put a check mark next to the information that answers questions from the K column. And they can put a star next to ideas that they found interesting. Have students consult other resources to find out the answers to questions that were not answered in the text. Discuss the information that students recorded in the L column.
