For years, I dreamed of being a professional writer. I believed I had important things to say that the world needed to hear. But as I look back on what it really takes to become an author, I realize how different the process was from my expectations. Writing happens in fits and starts, in bits and pieces. You take one step at a time, then another and another. And just a heads up: What does it take to write a book? It happens in three phases: You have to start writing. This sounds obvious, but it may be the most overlooked step in the process. Once you start writing, you will face self-doubt and overwhelm and a hundred other adversaries. Nobody cares about the book that you almost wrote. We want to read the one you actually finished, which means no matter what, the thing that makes you a writer is your ability not to start a project, but to complete one. Below are 10 ridiculously simple tips that fall under each of these three major phases plus an additional 10 bonus tips. I hope they help you tackle and finish the book you dream of writing. Getting started We all have to start somewhere. With writing a book, the first phase is made up of four parts: Decide what the book is about Good writing is always about something. Write the argument of your book in a sentence, then stretch that out to a paragraph, and then to a one-page outline. Think of your book in terms of beginning, middle, and end. Anything more complicated will get you lost. Set a daily word count goal John Grisham began his writing career as a lawyer and new dad – in other words, he was really busy. Nonetheless, he got up an hour or two early every morning and wrote a page a day. After a couple of years, he had a novel. A page a day is only about words. You just need to write often. Setting a daily goal will give you something to aim for. Make it small and attainable so that you can hit your goal each day and start building momentum. Set a time to work on your book every day Consistency makes creativity easier. Feel free to take a day off, if you want, but schedule that ahead of time. It just needs to be different from where you do other activities. It should remind you of your commitment to finish this book. Again, the goal here is to not think and just start writing. Here, we are going to focus on the next three tips to help you get the book done: Set a total word count Begin with the end in mind. Think in terms of thousand word increments and break each chapter into roughly equal lengths. Here are some general guiding principles: The Communist Manifesto is an example of this, at about 18,000 words. The Great Gatsby is an example of this. Most Malcolm Gladwell books fit in this range. The Four-Hour Work Week falls in this range. The Steve Jobs biography would fit this category. Give yourself weekly deadlines You need a weekly goal. Make it a word count to keep things objective. You need to have something to aim for and a way to measure yourself. This is the only way I ever get any work done: These can be friends, editors, family. Commit to shipping No matter what, finish the book. Set a deadline or have one set for you. Then release it to the world. Send it to the publisher, release it on Amazon, do whatever you need to do to get it in front of people. The worst thing would be for you to quit once this thing is written. Embrace failure As you approach the end of this project, know that this will be hard and you will most certainly mess up. Just be okay with failing, and give yourself grace. Write another book Most authors are embarrassed by their first book. But without that first book, you will never learn the lessons you might otherwise miss out on. So, put your work out there, fail early, and try again. This is the only way you get better. You have to practice, which means you have to keep writing. Every writer started somewhere, and most of them started by squeezing their writing into the cracks of their daily lives. The ones who make it are the ones who show up day after day. You can do the same. But they never came to be. And in one way or another, the reason is always the same: Worse yet, you wrote a book, but nobody cared about it. Nobody bought or read it. Before you can launch a bestseller, first you have to write one. Before you can launch a bestseller, you have to write a bestseller. Just sit down and write. They are far more intentional than simply

sitting and letting the words flow. Every great writer needs a system they can trust. You and I are no different. This is the part that I never learned in any English class. Producing work that sells is not just about writing what you think is good. In other words, the writing process matters. It matters a lot. You have to not only finish your book but write one worthy of being sold. And if you want to maximize your chances of finishing your book, you need a proven plan. Writing books has changed my life. If you need some help staying motivated, here are another 10 tips to help you keep going in the process: Only write one chapter at a time Write and publish a novel, one chapter at a time, using Amazon Kindle Singles, Wattpad, or sharing with your email list subscribers. Write a shorter book The idea of writing a page masterpiece can be paralyzing. Instead, write a short book of poems or stories. Long projects are daunting. Start a blog to get feedback early Getting feedback early and often helps break up the overwhelm. Start a website on WordPress or Tumblr and use it to write your book a chapter or scene at a time. Then eventually publish all the posts in a hardcopy book. This is a little different than tradition blogging, but the same concepts apply. We created a free tool to help you know when your blog posts are ready to publish. Keep an inspiration list You need it in order to keep fresh ideas flowing. I use Evernote , but use a system that works for you. Keep a journal Then, rewrite the entries in a much more polished book format, but use some photocopies or scans of the journal pages as illustrations in the book. It rewards us with temporary relief from stress. Instead, plan for breaks ahead of time so you stay fresh: A coffee shop or library where people are actually working and not just socializing can help.

You started writing because you loved it! So how can you fall in love with writing again? Here are six strategies. From to early , I spent the vast majority of my writing time on freelance articles. At the end of a day of writing for profit, the last thing I wanted to do was write for fun. Then I decided on a job change. The end result was happier clients, higher pay, lower stress, and more energy to devote to creative projects. Take advantage of the honeymoon phase. Every project has a rush of creative ideas that floods in at the moment of epiphany but quickly starts to dissipate. While it can be dangerous to pursue every new idea, the alternative is to disregard the projects that have your creative juices flowing. I try to keep one project "in my sights," dedicating a half hour of writing to that project each day. The system has worked pretty well for me, and even the projects I abandon a few pages in serve to stimulate ideas and keep me in practice for other, more "serious" writing. Establish your romantic rituals. For all their issues, my parents also modeled some wonderfully positive romantic behavior. Every night, my dad makes my mom a cup of hot cocoa and rubs her back while they watch TV. Every night, they read together. Every Friday, they go out on an official date. My own ritual consists of getting a cup of tea my tea shelf rivals that of Ramona Flowers , turning off my wireless connection , turning on one of my various instrumental playlists, and diving in. As a result, any time I even start my ritual by readying my cup of tea , my brain shifts into writing mode. Stay above the Losada line. This ratio forms what we call the Losada line. This will keep your brain wired to believe the activity is positive, which lets you stay wired for all elements of your writing. The Neuroscience of Writing , but the short version is that what we think of as creativity gets short-circuited by black-and-white thinking. Just write whatever you feel like writing. Write without the intention of publishing, getting audience approval, or coming back to proof your work. If you find something worth making into an official project, great! But for now, drop your guilt, discard your ego, and let yourself write for the sake of enjoying it. Why do you write? What is it you love about writing? Or is writing the one you want to stick with? Figure out what the ideal form of writing would look like for you, then strive to write in that way and for that purpose. I learned to love writing when I was nine years old. When I started writing as a full-time profession, I learned to hate it. Luckily, I was able to re-approach the process in ways that ignited my passion.
