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Each of us is a singular narrative, which is constructed, continually, unconsciously, by, through, and in us — through our perceptions, our feelings, our thoughts, our actions; and not least, our discourse, our spoken narrations. Biologically, physiologically, we are not so different from each other; historically, as narratives, we are each of us unique. To be ourselves we must have ourselves — possess, if needs be re-possess, our life stories. A man needs such a narrative — Sacks, Even ideas that may seem novel in the context of the therapy literature are in fact drawn from broader and richer cultural traditions. Claims to originality in the therapy field can only be made through ignorance of sources. But at the same time every therapy is a new therapy. However, each therapist brings to his or her work a repertoire of personal experience and values. This book examines the role and significance of stories in psychotherapy. I have been aware, in writing it, of the part that stories have played in my own life. For me, there was a long period where I found it hard to tell or listen to stories. I can see that there have been many factors that have had the effect of distancing me from an appreciation of stories. My mother and father came from a working-class community in which rich, vivid stories of everyday events and great moments in family life were at the heart of the conversational flow. For various reasons, I was not really part of this community. From a fairly early age, I was being prepared for something else. I was the first member of our family to get a degree. Through the educational process that went with all this, I seemed to be socialised into a different way of thinking about things. In becoming trained as a counsellor and psychotherapist, I learned to listen to my clients and to myself, but I was not listening for stories; I was listening for clues to whatever was beyond the story. And of course I experienced all this from the perspective of being a man. And perhaps men have more trouble with stories than women do. I mention these things because I suspect that other people have had similar experiences in relation to stories. A great many people in the modern world are cut off from community or extended family oral traditions. Many people, certainly those who control what takes place in the professions, have passed through an educational system that places little value on stories. As so often happens, it was a client who taught me this, a person who came to me with a self-narrative that was tragic and seemingly without hope. Somewhere during this therapy I realised that what this person was doing made most sense to me in terms of narrative processes such as telling, editing and re-writing. Around this time, I came across *Narrative Means to Therapeutic Ends* by Michael White and David Epston, which provided a framework for understanding what it means to work therapeutically with stories. I had always believed that psychology and psychotherapy are primarily cultural disciplines, that we construct personhood and identity and our theories of personhood and identity from the cultural resources available to us. And this insight led back into much personal exploration, of my own experience of storytelling, my sensitivity to stories, my authority. What is this book about? What it is saying is this: Whatever you are doing, or think you are doing, as therapist or client can be understood in terms of telling and re-telling stories. If there is any common ground among narrative therapies, it lies in the intention to give the client every opportunity to tell his or her story, to really listen to these stories, and to allow space for the telling of new or different stories. The importance of listening to stories, rather than just employing listening skills in general, or listening to or for other types of communication, is that the story represents the basic means by which people organise and communicate the meaning of events and experiences. Not listening to stories deprives both therapist and client of the most effective and mutually involving mode of discourse available to both of them. It is my belief that adopting a narrative perspective on therapy leads inevitably in the direction of a number of significant implications. Taking a narrative approach requires doing some re-thinking about the nature of truth, the concept of the person, the relationship between therapist and client,

the knowledge base of psychotherapy. At the moment there seems to be a lot of interest being shown in the counselling and psychotherapy literature over ways of working with stories and narratives, and also a lot of confusion. It seems to me that much of the confusion arises from lack of clarity over whether the therapists concerned are inserting the concept of narrative into already existing theoretical frameworks, or are taking as their starting point a social constructionist view of the world which places a sense of the person as a story-making and story-consuming being right at the centre of its conceptual framework. There is a coherence to social constructionist uses of narrative in therapy, whereas writers from other traditions seem to have [Page xi]selectively sampled those aspects of narrative thinking that are consistent with their existing ideas, while rejecting or ignoring those elements that, for them, do not fit. Because narrative therapies are associated with a distinctive philosophical and political position that can be characterised as social constructionist Gergen, , I have chosen in this book to give my account of some of the central notions of narrative and culture, before moving into a discussion of some of the ways in which these ideas can be applied in counselling and psychotherapy. Because I view psychotherapy not just as a process occurring between client and therapist, but also as a cultural form that encompasses research, training and organisation, the book concludes by reviewing the significance of narrative theory for these domains. In preparing this book, I have been painfully aware of how large a topic narrative therapy is, and how little I know about it. Throughout the book, there are references to what is an expanding and powerful literature on narrative, cultural psychology and allied approaches to therapy. My hope is that readers will find in this rich literature some further illumination in respect of topics to which I have not done justice. I could not have written this book without the support and help of many friends and colleagues. Susan Worsey and Rosemary Campbell at Sage have been unswervingly helpful and patient editors. Finally, but most important of all, I would not be anywhere without my family – my wife, Julia, and my daughters, Kate, Emma and Hannah.
