Get comfortable with the discomfort. Expect it, anticipate it, and prepare for it. Growth always entails discomfort. You need to go through the awkwardness to get better. Even though Adele threw up before performing at the Grammy Awards, she sang live again at the 85th Academy Awards in and nailed it. She reportedly used hypnotherapy and Qi Gong breathing exercises to ease her anxiety. Explore what tactics will help you stay calm before your next big presentation. Focus on getting results, not on getting approval. Keep your goal clear in your mind. Is it to inform, educate, or convince? Or is it to motivate, uplift, and inspire? He says, "I always feel so pretentious talking about comedy and deconstructing it. It always feels somehow self-centred A lot of it is just trying stuff, and having the freedom to attempt something and fail. Make your presentation airtight, rock solid, and impossible to poke holes into. Support your points with evidence. Avoid absolutes like "always," "everyone," and "everything. In the wonderful world of entertainment, famous celebrities are notoriously known and have to be placed into the limelight on a daily basis. These celebrities have to know how to adapt to flashing cameras in their faces, and meet crazed fans, even when they don't feel like it.

Stagefright is a bug, or more accurately a series of similar bugs, in an Android programming library called libstagefright. Libstagefright is part of the operating system that handles media files such as movies. If you receive an MMS Multimedia Messaging Service message that links to a video, or watch a clip embedded in a web page, or download a video for later, your Android will probably load up and use the libstagefright software to play the file. Researchers at Zimperium found a number of memory corruption bugs in the libstagefright code, and prepared a paper for the recent Black Hat conference to talk about them. Presentations at Black Hat that deal with vulnerabilities in widespread devices often get a lot of publicity before the event, and with Zimperium claiming that some Androids might be at risk, Stagefright got more publicity than most. Public exploit code But that was a month ago, and the company has now decided to wait no longer. Zimperium has published a Python program that generates booby-trapped MP4 movie files, apparently to help you test whether your device is patched. EXE is a standard proof-of-concept in the Windows world. The good news is that the exploit seems, at best, to be device specific. At any rate, the blog article says that: This exploit has several caveats. First, it is not a generic exploit. We only tested it to work on a single device model. We tested this exploit on a Nexus running Android 4. Finally, this vulnerability was one of several that was neutered by GCC 5. As we explained in a recent article about booby-trapped files in that article we dealt with a Word-based attack rather than a movie-based one, modern exploits often rely on two tricks. One is known as a spray, where the attacker knows he can crash your device, but is only able to aim control at a general area of memory. Padding or repeating your attack code is known as spraying memory, for obvious reasons. The memory available for allocation to a program is known as the heap, and the heap layout will typically vary between different devices, between different versions of the operating system, and even between reboots. As Zimperium points out, this greatly diminishes the chance that its proof-of-concept exploits will work in the real world without modification. So, the attacker needs to identify code fragments that are already in executable memory, and string them together as a precursor to his attack. He then creates a list of the addresses at which these fragments are located, and jumps to them in turn. ASLR does what its name suggests: When you send your exploit out into the real world, you may find that instead of making a series of pre-programmed turns that just happen to lead onto the freeway, you end up crashed into a hedge or stuck in a ditch. ASLR and the vagaries of the heap notwithstanding, the vulnerabilities found by Zimperium are real. Even exploited inexpertly, they could be used by malcontents to crash important programs on your device. A denial-of-service attack is generally less of an issue than outright remote code execution, but it can still cause serious problems, especially if the attacker repeatedly crashes a program you rely upon to do your job. He can simply send you one or more MMSes that link to booby-trapped movie files, and your phone will process them in the background. And one way around ASLR and heap variation is to try the same attack over and over again, adjusting the addresses that you wire into your exploit every time. Firefox are up-to-date, too. I stopped playing all together a few years after graduating. I truly miss my horn and my music, but even today thinking about playing in front of people makes my heart skip a beat. That is a regret I will take to my grave "but I have no one to blame but myself. I was a young child of nine and was standing in front of a group of women and children, all familiar to me. I was to play my harmonica for a solo accompanied by my school teacher. She whispered to me not to be afraid just before I started to play. I had not been afraid before that, but was a little nervous because of her caution. Since then I have been nervous about talking in front of people. The experience repeated itself over and over: Thinking that I was just shy and feeling woefully inadequate I headed off to the Army to make myself worthy of my imaginary lady in waiting. When I came back to find that she had married, the painful lesson inspired me to soldier on while occasionally choking in front of audiences and making a fool out of myself. When I finally went to a psychiatrist to admit that I had a problem, he said: I had been in manufacturing management for five years, but had never really been required to address a large group before. I was asked by my boss to address the employees during the United Way Fund Drive. It was a fairly big event with the corporate president, our company president, and several others from upper management in attendance. I remember thinking to myself "How hard can this be? Just get up there and be yourself. I remember approaching the lectern to give my speech when my legs gave out. I gave my presentation holding myself up by my elbows. To this day I have no idea what I said or how long I spoke. I do remember the glazed eyes and the questioning expressions on the faces in the audience. I have since joined Toastmasters and have been dealing effectively with this fear ever since. What I had on the first line of my card so I could get my motor going was "hello, my name is Bob W and the rest was easy. In my mid-forties, I entered to law school. My parents were very proud of my decision. My father often told me as much. Right before my second year of school began, my father passed away and I spoke at his funeral. I grew up speaking in front of groups and congregations and this had never happened to me before. I stood there for a moment and remembered that my father was really proud of me and loved me, closed my leather notecase and "winged" it. Later, at the repast, everyone, including the minister, told me how wonderful my speech was.
