This means that children who enter school with weaker verbal abilities are much more likely to experience difficulties learning literacy skills than those who do not. One spoken language skill that is strongly connected to early reading and writing is phonological awareness – the recognition that words are made up of separate speech sounds, for example, that the word dog is composed of three sounds: As children playfully engage in sound play, they eventually learn to segment words into their separate sounds, and "map" sounds onto printed letters, which allows them to begin to learn to read and write. Children who perform well on sound awareness tasks become successful readers and writers, while children who struggle with such tasks often do not. Who is at Risk? There are some early signs that may place a child at risk for the acquisition of literacy skills. Preschool children with speech and language disorders often experience problems learning to read and write when they enter school. Other factors include physical or medical conditions e. Role of the Speech-Language Pathologist Speech-language pathologists SLPs have a key role in promoting the emergent literacy skills of all children, and especially those with known or suspected literacy-related learning difficulties. The SLP may help to prevent such problems, identify children at risk for reading and writing difficulties, and provide intervention to remediate literacy-related difficulties. Prevention efforts involve working in collaboration with families, other caregivers, and teachers to ensure that young children have high quality and ample opportunities to participate in emergent literacy activities both at home and in daycare and preschool environments. SLPs also help older children or those with developmental delays who have missed such opportunities. Children who have difficulty grasping emergent literacy games and activities may be referred for further assessment so that intervention can begin as early as possible to foster growth in needed areas and increase the likelihood of successful learning and academic achievement. Promoting literacy development, however, is not confined to young children. Older children, particularly those with speech and language impairments, may be functioning in the emergent literacy stage and require intervention aimed at establishing and strengthening these skills that are essential to learning to read and write. What Parents Can Do You can help your child develop literacy skills during regular activities without adding extra time to your day. There also are things you can do during planned play and reading times. Show your children that reading and writing are a part of everyday life and can be fun and enjoyable. Activities for preschool children include the following: Talk to your child and name objects, people, and events in the everyday environment. Talk to your child during daily routine activities such as bath or mealtime and respond to his or her questions. Introduce new vocabulary words during holidays and special activities such as outings to the zoo, the park, and so on. Engage your child in singing, rhyming games, and nursery rhymes. Writers, among other creative types, achieve a sort of immortality when their works fall onto syllabi, win prestigious awards and attain critical success—even if they never received a penny for any of it during their lifespan. Some, unfortunately, shuffle off the mortal coil before they have a chance to truly explore their full potential. What one considers "young" or "old," of course, varies from individual to individual and culture to culture. Please take no offense to this decision! The Pulitzer Prize-winning author of the absolutely essential *A Confederacy of Dunces* unfortunately never lived to receive his accolades—or even see it published. Both Wallace and beloved comic writer and jazz critic Harvey Pekar tragically died as a direct result of antidepressants. After switching prescriptions, the year-old author of *Infinite Jest*, *The Broom of the System* and more, succumbed to over 20 years of clinical depression and hanged himself in . Author and screenwriter West died in a car accident at the age of 37, along with his year-old wife Eileen McKinney. Before and after his passing, West influenced such notable writers as Vladimir Nabokov, Martin Amis and plenty of others. Even now, *The Day of the Locust* remains one of the quintessential commentaries on the frustrating artifice, posturing and shallowness of the Hollywood machine. As with many other brilliant minds on this list, Sylvia Plath spent much of her tragically short life grappling against depression. Best known for her highly evocative poems drawing from personal experience, she also penned the semi-autobiographical novel *The Bell Jar*—her only foray into the format. Unfortunately, however, even his attentive care could not prevent her suicide at the tragically young age of . Many literary critics and poetry aficionados consider Keats one of the greatest English-language Romantic poets of all time. He was only 25 years old at the time of his death, following an extended bout with tuberculosis. In spite of his age, however, the poet managed to compile an amazing body of work, with about three complete volumes under his belt. Impressive, considering he had only taken up writing about six years prior and had only been publishing for four. This contemporary of Keats shared both his Romantic predilections and early death. At 29, Shelley died after his beloved schooner capsized during an unexpected thunderstorm. Some blame pirates, others a pitiful sense of direction. Also like Keats, Shelley only attracted a few fans, with most of his lyrical output criticized or ignored. Only after his passing did the literary sphere embrace his Romantic writings and forge a lasting legacy. Nineteenth Century Romantic poets sport a pattern of dying young and dying dramatically. Like her father, Lord Byron, Ada Lovelace also died violently at . She suffered from uterine cancer, and the resultant bloodletting only hastened the process. Unlike her father, however, she earned a name for herself authoring computer programs rather than poetry. Ironically, Jack Kerouac became the cornerstone of the beat generation—a movement he actively despised. *The Dharma Bums* and *On the Road* among plenty of other books and poems scribe found inspiration in everything from James Joyce to jazz to Buddhism, aligning himself with other pillars of beatnik culture, including William S. Burroughs, Neal Cassady and Allen Ginsberg. Death, extreme patriotism and bushido philosophies all factored into his impressive body of work, which included a screenplay, hundreds of short stories and essays, 18 plays and 40 novels, including *The Sound of Waves*, *The Sailor Who Fell from Grace with the Sea*, and *The Temple of the Golden Pavilion*. Considered one of the greatest Japanese writers of the 20th Century if not all time, Mishima received numerous literary awards in his native country and earned 3 Nobel Prize nominations. To this day, *The Red Badge of Courage* remains one of the most memorable American war satires ever written. Though Crane passed away at age 28 after contracting tuberculosis, he left behind an incredible bibliography consisting of 6 novels, 2 poetry collections and 3 short story anthologies. *Maggie*, *Girl of the Streets* launched his career as a novelist, introducing the world to his naturalist sensibilities and razor-sharp sense of irony. Along with sisters Charlotte and Anne, Emily Bronte published literary works under a genderless pseudonym

Iberian-Latin American traditions[edit] Beginning in the 1960s and following the Italian cantautori style of the 1960s like the one of Domenico Modugno , many Latin American countries developed singer-songwriter traditions that adopted elements from various popular styles. Caetano Veloso At around the same time, the Brazilian popular style bossa nova was evolving into a politically charged singer-songwriter tradition called Tropicalismo. Two performers, Gilberto Gil and Caetano Veloso became two of the most famous people in all of Brazil through their work in Tropicalismo. After World War II it was developed in Italy a very prolific singer-songwriter in Italian cantautore tradition, initially connected with the French school of the chansonniers, and lately developed very heterogeneously. Although the term cantautore normally implies consistent sociopolitical content in lyrics, noteworthy performers in a more inclusive singer-songwriter categorization are: They all perform in Maltese. Spain and Portugal have also had singer-songwriter traditions, which are sometimes said to have drawn on Latin elements. Trova as a genre has had broad influence across Latin America. In the 1960s, a singer-songwriter tradition called canto popular emerged in Uruguay. For years solo artists would dominate Brazilian popular music with romantic cynicism alla Jobim or subliminal anti-government messages alla Chico Buarque. After the end of the military dictatorship in Brazil , Brazilian music became less politically and socially conscious. Soviet Union and Russia[edit] Soviet and Russian bard Bulat Okudzhava Since the 1960s, those singers who wrote songs outside the Soviet establishment have been known as "bards". Many bards performed their songs in small groups of people using a Russian guitar , rarely if ever would they be accompanied by other musicians or singers. Though, bards using piano or accordion are also known. Those who became popular held modest concerts. The first nationwide-famous bards starting their career in the 1960s are traditionally referred to as the First Five: In the course of the 1960s, the shift to the classical 6-string guitar took place, and now, a Russian guitar is a rare bird with the bards. In the same period, the movement of KSP Kluby Samodeyatelnoy Pesni "amateur song fan clubs emerged, providing the bards with highly educated audience, and up to the end of the 1960s being their key promotion engine. Bards were rarely permitted to record their music, partly given the political nature of many songs, partly due to their vague status in the strictly organised state-supported show business establishment of the USSR. As a result, bard tunes usually made their way around as folk lore, from mouth to mouth, or via the copying of amateur recordings sometimes referred as magnitizdat made at concerts, particularly those songs that were of political nature. Bard poetry differs from other poetry mainly in the fact that it is sung along with a simple guitar melody as opposed to being spoken. Another difference is that this form of poetry focuses less on style and more on meaning. This means that fewer stylistic devices are used, and the poetry often takes the form of narrative. What separates bard poetry from other songs is the fact that the music is far less important than the lyrics; chord progressions are often very simple and tend to repeat from one bard song to another. A far more obvious difference was the commerce-free nature of the genre: The similar genre dominated by singers-songwriters is known as sung poetry in other Post-Soviet countries. Bulgaria[edit] Singer-songwriters are popular in Bulgaria under the name "bards", or "poets with guitars". Their tradition is a mixture of traditional folk motifs, city folklore from the early 20th century, and modern influences. In the 1960s, 1970s, and 1980s, the Communist regime in the country started to tolerate the Bulgarian "bards", promoting the so-called "political

songs", performed usually by one-man bands. A national festival tradition was established, under the title "Alen Mak" Red Poppy, a symbol with strong Communist meaning in Bulgaria. At the same time, there were some prominent underground figures which were against the official Communist Party line, such as Angel "Jendema" Angelov, Yavor "Yavkata" Rilov, and Velizar "Valdes" Vankov. Romania[edit] Despite the communist isolation, the tradition of the singer-songwriter in Romania flourished beginning with the end of the 1980s and it was put in the context of folk music, with its three main styles in Romania: Still, with the merit of supporting great opening initiatives: Overall, the Romanian folk, in general, could be marked as an underground cultural movement, somewhere between non-aligned and protest music.
