Freddie, as evidenced by his Dionysian Live Aid performance, was easily the most godlike of them all. A notable aspect of Queen concerts was the large scale involved. Queen guitarist Brian May claims that Mercury was unimpressed with his own abilities at the piano and used the instrument less over time because he wanted to walk around onstage and entertain the audience. Songs like " Ogre Battle " and " Crazy Little Thing Called Love " were composed on the guitar; the latter featured Mercury playing rhythm guitar on stage and in the studio. The Solo Collection In addition to his work with Queen, Mercury put out two solo albums and several singles. Although his solo work was not as commercially successful as most Queen albums, the two off-Queen albums and several of the singles debuted in the top 10 of the UK Music Charts. The song, written by Giorgio Moroder in collaboration with Mercury, debuted at the number 10 position in the UK charts. It was produced by Moroder and Mack. Bad Guy and Barcelona Bad Guy as "outstanding from start to finish" and expressed his view that Mercury "did a commendable job of stretching into uncharted territory". Many critics were uncertain what to make of the album; one referred to it as "the most bizarre CD of the year". The album debuted in the UK top He lived with Austin for several years in West Kensington , London. By the mids, the singer had begun an affair with a male American record executive at Elektra Records , and in December , Mercury told Austin of his sexuality, which ended their romantic relationship. To me, she was my common-law wife. To me, it was a marriage. Hutton said Mercury died wearing the wedding band that Hutton had given him. In the s, he would often distance himself from his partner, Jim Hutton, during public events. Mercury once said of himself: So entertaining and generous. He played some tennis, lounged by the pool, and ventured out to the odd gay club or bar at night. Mercury recorded his final vocal here in May In December , the studio was opened free as the "Queen Studio Experience", with fans asked for a donation to the Mercury Phoenix Trust charity. Mercury denied he had the disease. May says of Mercury: I want to just sing this and

do it and when I am gone you can finish it off. He [Freddie] was one of the funniest people I ever encountered. I was laughing most of the time, with him. His former partner, Mary Austin, had been a particular comfort in his final years, and in the last few weeks of his life made regular visits to his home to look after him. I felt it correct to keep this information private to date to protect the privacy of those around me. However, the time has come now for my friends and fans around the world to know the truth and I hope that everyone will join with me, my doctors and all those worldwide in the fight against this terrible disease. My privacy has always been very special to me and I am famous for my lack of interviews. Please understand this policy will continue. On the evening of 24 November , just over 24 hours after issuing that statement, Mercury died at the age of 45 at his home in Kensington. The whereabouts of his ashes are believed to be known only to Austin, who has stated that she will never reveal where she buried them. Wearing his yellow military jacket from his concerts , GQ called it his best known look. This is where he had written and recorded his last songs at Mountain Studios. However, he never made it back into the studio, so May later recorded the final verse of the song.
