

Chapter 1 : Jungle () - IMDb

*Forced to live off rats and make loincloths out of tree bark: Man who spent 41 YEARS living in the jungle after fleeing Vietnam war makes emotional return to his former home.*

It is certainly one of his most frequently reprinted and anthologised works. And as if to mark the beginning of modernism in the twentieth century, it is a story in which almost nothing happens. In fact that is one of the key features of the story. It is worth noting that although Henry James made a number of technical innovations to both the story and the novel as literary genres, he gave his shorter works the collective name of tales. These works are rarely as short, condensed, and understated as we now think of narratives categorised as short stories: *The Beast in the Jungle* "critical commentary This story has been the subject of enormous amounts of critical commentary " partly because it is such a powerful narrative, and partly because its eventless and abstract subject lends itself to a number of possible interpretations. These are variations of three basic types " existential, biographical, and psychological. After all, Kafka would be writing about lonely figures trapped inside vague fears and presentiments only a few years after James wrote *The Beast in the Jungle*. Marcher is after all a civil servant, and although we have no account of his working life, it is quite clear that it is regimented and unexciting. He lives in London and his situation is that of an isolated city-dweller. He feels a presentiment, and is not even sure if what awaits him in life will be of a positive or negative nature. That is part of the existential threat " not knowing what it will be and when it will come. That is its existential nature: Throughout his life he had enjoyed relationships with a number of women " but only as friends. And he also worried terribly about the idea that he ought to be married. It was the normal, acceptable thing to do, but he could not face the prospect of commitment. But many of his stories reflect a deep-seated fear of women as potential or actual sources of problems. And of course many post-Freudian commentators have observed the submerged homo-erotic elements in his work. He cannot marry May because it would be unfair to subject her to such uncertainty. That is his rationale " but in fact he continues to harrass her with discussions of his fear right up to the point of her death. Psychological Marcher is a man imprisoned in a solipsistic world. He has conceived this notion that something sets him aside from his fellow creatures. He believes he is destined for a special destiny. It might not be positive, it might even be tragic " but it will be something outstanding or momentous " which will confirm his superiority over other lesser beings. He has no evidence to support the validity of this supposition. He merely feels it and asserts it. We are led to believe from the inferences in the text that she hopes he will one day realise that she is the thing that is to happen to him. And as if to make it more vivid to him she rose from her chair " a movement she seldom made in these days " and showed herself, all draped and all soft, in her fairness and slimness. Discovery[ edit ] She came to international attention after emerging filthy, naked and scarred from the dense jungle of Ratanakiri province in remote northeastern Cambodia on January 13, After a villager noticed food missing from a lunch box, he staked out the area, spotted the woman, gathered some friends and caught her. Theories about identity[ edit ] After hearing about the incident, year-old Sal Lou [4] or Sar Yo [5] , member of the Pnong ethnic minority [3] and Oyadao village policeman, traveled to the area and claimed that the woman was his long-lost daughter. He last saw his daughter when she was eight years old; in , she was lost in the jungle while tending water buffalo near the border with Vietnam. She was able to use a spoon without instruction. Local police reported that she was only able to say three words: A Spanish psychologist who visited the woman reported that she "made some words and smiled in response to a game involving toy animals and a mirror" but did not speak any recognizable language. She preferred to crawl rather than walk upright. Her mother constantly had to pull back on the clothes when she tried to take them off. A visiting Guardian reporter described the family as genuinely caring for her and the woman as listless and sad but restless at night. Penn Bunna, an official at Adhoc , another Cambodian human rights group, said the constant flow of visitors likely caused stress for the woman. The Spanish psychologist was still seeing her, and she had adjusted a bit better to her new surroundings, but still would not speak. The father was trying to raise money so that he could take his daughter to a spirit healer who could help exorcise the "jungle spirits" from his daughter. She laughed while playing with her little nieces and nephews. Her father said that she had not adjusted, could not speak, and was always trying to remove her clothes and run away. He asked for charities to take over her care. Her father said that she went to take a bath in the well behind their house and did not return. She spent 11 days there," he said, adding that her body was soaked with excrement up to her chest. She did not speak but had started to make eye contact with people. He claimed that she had disappeared in at age 23, following a mental breakdown, indicating that she had survived in the jungle for approximately one year as opposed to the 18â€”19 previously thought. The adoptive family was supportive of this new claim. Vietnamese media have reported that her birth father discovered her through photographs on Facebook. The woman never learned to speak while living with her adoptive family in Cambodia, and according to her Vietnamese birth family, she has been that way since birth.
