And Kent Live has compiled a list of those who have been jailed so far in These criminals have been put behind bars for a litany of crimes committed in the county in recent times. Killers, paedophiles, fraudsters and drug dealers all make prominent appearances in this list.

Alex Hamill – Drug dealing Image: Kent Police Alex Hamill, of no fixed address, was jailed for two years after being caught with a pocket full of heroin and crack cocaine in Chatham. The year-old ran from officers after answering the door of a home in Thorold Road in November last year. He was caught at the back of the property with his hand in his trouser pocket. Inside were a number of wraps containing Class A drugs. Officers searched the home and found more than 60 wraps of Class A drugs, cash and scales. He was sentenced at Maidstone Crown Court on January 4. [Read More](#)

Dominic Phoenix - Rape and indecent assault Dominic Phoenix, of Wood Street, Dover, was jailed for 24 years for multiple rapes and one incident of indecent assault. The year-old was found guilty of carrying out numerous offences between and in the Deal area. He was arrested in after a teenage girl came forward to Kent Police. Phoenix was convicted of eight rapes and one indecent assault and was sentenced following a trial at Canterbury Crown Court on January 8. He will serve an additional four years on licence upon his release.

Joseph Mezen - Assault Image: During the evening of July 11, , a woman in her 30s was at home with her family in Wrentham Avenue, when she heard a knock at the door. She found a man dressed in a high-visibility jacket and gloves standing there who asked her to confirm the number of the property, before saying he had a delivery for her. As the victim leaned out of the door, the man hit her several times with a metal pole and then ran away - the victim was left screaming for help, having suffered head injuries which required hospital treatment. Following an investigation by Kent Police, year-old Mezen was identified as the attacker and arrested just over a week later. He was sentenced at Canterbury Crown Court on January The victim, who lives near to where the two women lived, received a knock on his door at 2. Harper then started smoking inside his flat before she helped herself to more money before they left the flat. The following day at around 8. She then pushed past the victim and started looking around his flat for money. The pair were sentenced on January 9.

Christopher Brewer - Drug dealing Christopher Brewer, 28, was jailed for eight-and-a-half years after pleading guilty to possessing cocaine with intent to supply, possessing criminal property and possessing of an identity document with improper intention. Police officers were called to the Nizels Lane property during the evening of September 13, , following reports of a disturbance. Brewer told officers at the scene three unknown men had burst into his flat and attacked him and a friend. There was a smell of chemicals which he claimed was a result of ammonia being used during the assault. Both men were taken to Tunbridge Wells Hospital, from where Brewer then fled wearing just a hospital gown and police at the flat later discovered quantities of cash and an air pistol. Further searches led to the discovery of large packages of cocaine, concealed in places including behind kickboards in the kitchen and on the roof, behind a chimney breast. Brewer was found to have boarded a flight to Spain just hours after fleeing the hospital, however on November 17 he was identified during a routine stop of a car by the UK Border Force in Coquelles, France. He tried to show a passport belonging to a friend but when the vehicle was searched his own passport was located and he was the identified as wanted and arrested. Brewer was sentenced at Canterbury Crown Court on January [Read More](#)

Brian Daniels - Possessing criminal property Brian Daniels, of Anchor Road, Rochester, was jailed for two years after pleading guilty to possession of criminal property and possession with intent to supply cannabis. On April 19, , the year-old met Edilson Struett at a pub car park near Ashford and handed him a package unaware they were being watched by the

police. Struett, 49, of Brenthouse Road, Hackney, told police he was a courier and had no idea what was in the package handed to him by Daniels. When he met the man he was given a mobile telephone and a piece of paper with a list of postcodes and phone numbers written on it. The first postcode was for the pub car park where he met with Daniels, who claimed he also did not know what was in the package he handed over. However, forensic tests provided evidence that the cash had been handled by him. They pleaded guilty and were sentenced at Canterbury Crown Court on January 3.

Ian Hendrie - Bomb hoaxer Image: Kent Police Ian Hendrie, of Coleridge Road, Dartford, was jailed for 22 months pleading guilty to a hoax bomb threat, five counts of assaulting a police officer and two counts of criminal damage. Six glass bottles filled with screws and nails were found at his home after he had told a social worker he had built a number of bombs. When officers attended his flat in October last year they found the bottles in a dustbin outside - they contained no explosives and were not dangerous. Hendrie was arrested and taken to a local hospital by officers who were concerned for his welfare - once there he became agitated and attacked those around him, and on arrival in custody he damaged his cell and assaulted officers. He was further charged with five counts of assaulting a police officer and two counts of criminal damage and was sentenced at Maidstone Crown Court on January

Read More Joe Smith - Kidnap Joe Smith, of Wellingtonia Way, Edenbridge, was jailed for three years after he attacked a woman in the town and then forced her into his car. Witnesses saw the year-old repeatedly assault his victim who was known to him and then grab her head before pushing her into a Renault Laguna last year. The alarm was raised during the evening of May 31, , as the victim was walking along Station Road. Kent Police received a number of calls at around 7. Smith denied the charge of kidnap but a jury found him guilty and he was sentenced at Maidstone Crown Court on January

Aaron Spendley - Fraud Image: Kent Police Aaron Spendley, of no fixed address, was jailed for 22 months for five counts of fraud. The year-old stole the bank cards of two women while they attended a church service in Ashford on November 19, He used the cards on the same day at a cash and carry shop in High Street, a petrol station in Brookfield Road and a supermarket in Brookfield Court to buy cigarettes. Spendley was identified after being caught on camera at one of the shops. He was arrested on December 29, and charged with five counts of fraud. He pleaded guilty to the charges and was sentenced at Canterbury Crown Court on January 5.

Ambrose Treeby - Burglary Image: Kent Police Ambrose Treeby, formerly of Queen Street, Paddock Wood, was jailed for four years and four months for four burglaries and one attempted burglary. The year-old targeted pensioners in areas including Tonbridge and Aylesford and repeatedly tricked his way into the homes of vulnerable victims, including a woman aged in her 90s, before stealing money from them. Treeby claimed to be from a local housing association and told the victim she had a fault with her telephone. He distracted the victim and after searching rooms, found where she kept some money - he took the cash and left. He targeted the same victim again on September 7, This time Treeby claimed he needed to remove a fridge. An year-old woman who lived on her own in Barden Road, Tonbridge was also targeted twice. The victim wanted him gone and handed over the money. Treeby left without moving the mattress and he visited again on September 9, this time claiming to work for the local council. He told the victim they had received complaints from residents about rats in her garden and was there to clear them. Treeby told her to sign a blank cheque and assured her he would fill out the amount and who it was payable to. Police were alerted and the cheque was stopped - other victims reported being targeted in Tenterden and Rye, Sussex. He pleaded guilty to all five charges and was sentenced at Maidstone Crown Court on January

The year-old, who was 21 at the time, handed himself in at Margate Police Station five hours after the incident in which the victim was stabbed in the leg following an altercation on June 18, , but he denied murdering the year-old. Aware that Mr Ward was about to visit the house, Buchanan armed himself with a kitchen knife and threatened to stab him. The pair were known to one another and had an ongoing dispute. When Mr Ward arrived at the house Buchanan was seen goading him from the kitchen window and was heard threatening to stab him if he came near, all the while he was still holding the knife and waving it at Mr Ward. His behaviour was witnessed by several people who were gathered for a barbecue outside. The victim retreated to his vehicle but Buchanan opened the front door of the house with the knife in his hand and continued to shout at Mr Ward. Mr Ward went back towards the house and both men argued in the kitchen for a short while before the victim left and got back into his car. It was at this point that

Buchanan emerged from the house and threw the knife at Mr Ward. It went through the open car window and stabbed him in the thigh. He drove off but only managed to get as far as Bush Avenue where he stumbled out of his car and onto the pavement, then collapsed on a driveway. An ambulance was called after he was found by a member of the public but paramedics were unable to resuscitate him. The knife had severed a main artery and he was declared dead at the scene just after 6pm. Buchanan was found guilty of manslaughter following a week-long trial at Canterbury Crown Court on January His sentencing has been adjourned until a later date. Kent Police Finbar Shirley, of Meadow Close, Bridge, was jailed for six years after he strangled a woman into silence after she caught him in her house during a burglary. The court heard how once inside the property he looked around the bedroom, took of his shoes and sat down on the bed. The woman passed out and it was only when her husband came upstairs and saw her laying on the floor that Shirley calmly walked away down the stairs and out of the house - the incident was reported to Kent Police before Shirley was identified and subsequently arrested. He admitted to burglary and assault and was sentenced at Canterbury Crown Court on January Anthony Charles - Grievous bodily harm with intent and possessing an offensive weapon in a public place Anthony Charles, of James Street, Gillingham, was jailed for 13 years for assaulting a man in the town with a machete. The year-old had pleaded not guilty to grievous bodily harm with intent and possessing an offensive weapon in a public place. These charges followed an incident near Mill Road, Gillingham, on February 12, where the victim, a year-old man, suffered injuries to his head and body which required hospital treatment. The victim had been out for the night in London and was in a vehicle with some friends when they stopped at a house near Victoria Street, Gillingham. Two women went inside the house before then leaving again and at this point Charles came out of the house and started shouting at the victim, a man he did not know. Charles threatened to hurt the victim and both the man and the two women walked back to the car before Charles came at the victim and hit him over the back of the head with a machete.
