Bibliographies and Guides Listed below are published guides to the genealogy collections of the Library of Congress, compiled by reference librarians and available in full text by selecting the desired link.

On January 26, 1800, he signed a bill that allowed the president to appoint the Librarian of Congress and establishing a Joint Committee on the Library to regulate and oversee it. The new law also extended borrowing privileges to the President and Vice President. However, he believed that all subjects had a place in the Library of Congress. I do not know that it contains any branch of science which Congress would wish to exclude from their collection; there is, in fact, no subject to which a Member of Congress may not have occasion to refer. Specifically, he grouped his books into Memory, Reason, and Imagination, which broke down into 44 more subdivisions. In 1802, a fire destroyed two thirds of the Jefferson collection, with only 2, books remaining. While Meehan was Librarian he supported and perpetuated the notion that "the congressional library should play a limited role on the national scene and that its collections, by and large, should emphasize American materials of obvious use to the U. His efforts were blocked by Smithsonian secretary Joseph Henry , who advocated a focus on scientific research and publication. Unable to resolve the conflict, Henry dismissed Jewett in July 1807. Around this time, the Library of Congress was making plans to build and relocate to the new Thomas Jefferson Building , which would be fire proof. He built broad bipartisan support for it as a national library and a legislative resource, aided by an overall expansion of the federal government and a favorable political climate. He began comprehensively collecting Americana and American literature , led the construction of a new building to house the Library, and transformed the Librarian of Congress position into one of strength and independence. The Library also acquired the vast libraries of the Smithsonian and of historian Peter Force , strengthening its scientific and Americana collections significantly. It moved from the Capitol building to its new headquarters in 1897 with more than 100,000 volumes, 40 percent of which had been acquired through copyright deposit. Spofford and six experts sent by the American Library Association [25] testified that the Library should continue its expansion towards becoming a true national library. Voorhees of Indiana, and established new administrative units for all aspects of the collection. Congress also strengthened the office of Librarian of Congress to govern the Library and make staff appointments, as well as requiring Senate approval for presidential appointees to the position. He instituted the interlibrary loan service, transforming the Library of Congress into what he referred to as a "library of last resort". In 1897, he persuaded President Theodore Roosevelt to transfer by executive order the papers of the Founding Fathers from the State Department to the Library of Congress. Putnam expanded foreign acquisitions as well, including the purchase of a four-thousand volume library of Indica , the purchase of G. Collections of Hebraica and Chinese and Japanese works were also acquired. In 1901, Congress passed an act allowing the Library of Congress to establish a trust fund board to accept donations and endowments, giving the Library a role as a patron of the arts. The Library received the donations and endowments of prominent individuals such as John D. Rockefeller , James B. Wilbur and Archer M. A number of chairs and consultantships were established from the donations, the most well-known of which is the Poet Laureate Consultant. Congress acquired nearby land in 1897 and approved construction of the Annex Building later the John Adams Building in 1938. Although delayed during the Depression years, it was completed in 1964 and opened to the public in 1965. Roosevelt appointed Archibald MacLeish as his successor. MacLeish encouraged librarians to oppose totalitarianism on behalf of democracy; dedicated the South Reading Room of the Adams Building to Thomas Jefferson, commissioning artist Ezra Winter to paint four themed murals for the room; and established a "democracy alcove" in the Main Reading Room of the Jefferson Building for important documents such as the Declaration, Constitution and The Federalist Papers. The Library of Congress even assisted during the war effort, ranging from the storage of the Declaration of

Missions played a variety of roles in the postwar world: Quincy Mumford took over in Mumford directed the Library during a period of increased educational spending, the windfall of which allowed the Library to devote energies towards establishing new acquisition centers abroad, including in Cairo and New Delhi. In , the Library began experimenting with book preservation techniques through a Preservation Office, which grew to become the largest library research and conservation effort in the United States. A memorandum by Douglas Bryant of the Harvard University Library , compiled at the request of Joint Library Committee chairman Claiborne Pell , proposed a number of institutional reforms, including expansion of national activities and services and various organizational changes, all of which would shift the Library more towards its national role over its legislative role. Bryant even suggested possibly changing the name of the Library of Congress, which was rebuked by Mumford as "unspeakable violence to tradition". Debate continued within the library community until the Legislative Reorganization Act of shifted the Library back towards its legislative roles, placing greater focus on research for Congress and congressional committees and renaming the Legislative Reference Service to the Congressional Research Service. The move released pressures on staff and shelf space, allowing Boorstin to focus on other areas of Library administration such as acquisitions and collections. His active and prolific role changed the post of Librarian of Congress so that by the time he retired in , The New York Times called it "perhaps the leading intellectual public position in the nation". President Ronald Reagan nominated James H. Billington as the 13th Librarian of Congress in , and the U. Senate unanimously confirmed the appointment. At the same time, it established new programs and employed new technologies to, "get the champagne out of the bottle. American Memory created in , which became The National Digital Library in , providing free access online to digitized American history and culture resources with curatorial explanations for K education. With a major gift from David Rubenstein in , the Library also established the Library of Congress Literacy Awards to recognize and support achievements in improving literacy in the U. Kluge in to bring scholars and researchers from around the world to use Library resources and to interact with policymakers and the public. Open World began as a Library of Congress project, and later became an independent agency in the legislative branch. Librarians all over the world consult these catalogs, through the Web or through other media better suited to their needs, when they need to catalog for their collection a book published in the United States. The library also has off-site storage facilities for less commonly requested materials. Thomas Jefferson Building[edit] Main article: It first opened in as the main building of the Library and is the oldest of the three buildings. The building was originally known as The Annex to the Main Building, which had run out of space. It opened its doors to the public January 3, The building was constructed from to , and serves as the official memorial to President James Madison. The theater hosts regular free screenings of classic and contemporary movies and television shows. It is named to honor David Woodley Packard , whose Packard Humanities Institute oversaw design and construction of the facility. The centerpiece of the complex is a reproduction Art Deco movie theater that presents free movie screenings to the public on a semi-weekly basis. This process is done every three years, with the Register receiving proposals from the public and acting as an advisor to the Librarian, who issues a ruling on what is exempt. After three years have passed, the ruling is no longer valid and a new ruling on exemptions must be made. One may not remove library items from the reading rooms or the library buildings. Access to the closed stacks is not permitted under any circumstances, except to authorized Library staff, and occasionally, to dignitaries. Only the reading room reference collections are on open shelves. Since , American libraries have been able to request books and other items through interlibrary loan from the Library of Congress if these items are not readily available elsewhere. Through this system, the Library of Congress has served as a "library of last resort", according to former Librarian of Congress Herbert Putnam. Individuals are invited to apply for projects which would further the multi-faceted mission of the Law Library in serving the U. Congress, other governmental agencies, and the public.

The Library of Congress has a genealogical collection that rivals that of the New York Public Library in size and scope. There are some 10, genealogical indexes, guides, and other reference works available, all arranged by family name. The reference collection and catalogs are intended to facilitate research in U. The staff of the Library of Congress cannot undertake research in family history or heraldry. Beginning genealogists should study how to research their family histories before coming to the Library. A basic knowledge of genealogical procedures allows researchers to make better use of their time and improve their chances of success. An additional supplement entitled Genealogies Cataloged by the Library of Congress Since was issued in Researchers will find these books in many public libraries. The Library provides cost estimates for orders exceeding 25 exposures. Photocopy rates are 50 cents exposure. Payments may be made by MasterCard or Visa, an international money order, or a check drawn on a U. A double check of a request should always be requested. Despite these drawbacks, the Library of Congress is the largest library in the United States, and it would be a mistake to ignore its enormous genealogical collection, which includes many resources not available elsewhere. The function of libraries is three-fold. Libraries acquire information, organize that information in a way it can be retrieved, and disseminate the information the library has acquired. Reference services fulfill this last function. Reference services may vary from library to library, but most libraries have an information or Reference Desk where assistance from a librarian is available. Almost all libraries provide reference services via the telephone and many libraries offer email, text, or chat services with a reference librarian. There are three main types of reference assistance: Assistance or instruction with using the library, including locating materials, using the catalog, using computers to access information, and using basic reference sources. Assistance identifying library materials needed to answer a question. Providing brief, factual answers to questions, such as addresses, statistics, phone numbers, etc. Types of Reference Sources Reference sources such as dictionaries, encyclopedias, almanacs, atlases, etc. Reference sources provide answers to specific questions, such as brief facts, statistics, and technical instructions; provide background information; or direct you to additional information sources. Reference sources are not scholarly peer-reviewed. In most libraries, reference sources do not circulate and are located in a separate reference collection. This practice makes reference sources readily available and easily accessible. Reference sources are designed to be consulted rather than read through. Reference materials can be arranged alphabetically, topically, or chronologically. Many will contain cross listed information and more than one index. If it is not obvious how a reference source is organized, take a moment to look through the explanatory or how-to-use information, which is usually presented at the beginning of the book, or in HELP screens for online products. There are thousands of reference sources available that cover practically every subject. Although the term reference "book" is frequently used, reference sources can be books, serials, on-line databases or information found on the Internet. A large part of using reference sources well is choosing the right one for your needs. Despite the wide variety available, reference sources can be categorized into a handful of groups. Think about the kind of information you need and how you will use it. If you are unsure which reference tool is best suited to your information need, a reference librarian will be able to assist you.
