Food Safe Marker I learned a lot my first time trying this and want to share what I have found with you. Begin by picking your food gel color and find some way to get it on your stamp. Attach the stamp to the clear block and then dab it in the ink. Notice how messy mine is from trying to dab it on the paper towel when it was on the plate. You may need to dab a bit of ink off before you try to stamp your cookie. Then, carefully place the stamp on the cookie and press down. You may need to rock it slightly to make sure the entire outline transfers onto the cookie. Then, gently lift the stamp straight up off the cookie. Once you stamp the image on the cookie, you can call it a day and let it dry completely or, you can add a few details. A few snow lines and snowflakes aka dots, is just what this cookie needed. I love the simplicity of these so I decided to stop here. If you want, you can paint or use food safe markers to color the little characters or use other stamps on a cookie. See this little penguins arm? I lifted it slightly when I was pressing and it made a double line at the top of the igloo. Somehow, it only made two lines at the top so, I will chose to ignore it and pretend it is a masterpiece. Are you with me? I know some people who are very concerned about food safety and that is a good thing. Either way, let the cookie eater make their own choice. By spending time each day researching your stamps in catalogs or other reference publications, one will gain great insight to the meaning and purpose behind each stamp. You might also be able to seek out or join a local stamp club.

Online tools and resources for researching your stamp collection August 09, The American Philatelic Research Library has a vast holding of philatelic research material. It is easier and faster than ever before to find a book, article or document that will help you learn about a stamp or cover you have in your collection. Today, major philatelic libraries have their card catalogs online. A search through these card catalogs can help locate all kinds of documentation about an incredibly wide variety of subjects. The American Philatelic Research Library has had its card catalog online for several years. You can access the online catalog at www.aprl.org. If you are a member of the American Philatelic Society, materials you borrow from the library will be mailed to you for a small fee plus the cost of postage both ways. If you do not have Internet access at home, your local public library probably has one or more computers designated for public use, and library staff who can help you. Barring that, you can always call the APRL at ext. Before you begin your Internet search, take a few moments to click and read the instructions for using the library services. Once that has been done, you can click "Online Catalog" and begin by searching keywords, author, title, subject, language and other kinds of records. There is an instruction box to the right of the search screen. This tells you how to improve your search by using various symbols and words. It takes a little practice, but just finding one reference source you did not know existed makes it all worthwhile. To test the search function for this article, I used a subject from my own collection: These stamps are overprinted "B. The search netted 23 records, some of which were books and some of which were articles. To find out more about a suggested publication, click "Full Display" in the link below the item that is described. If you want to borrow that item, click "Add to Cart. The catalog search is also a magnificent way to find articles in magazines or journals that you already own. Other philatelic libraries also have card catalogs that are accessible to you via the Internet. Find out more about philatelic libraries by visiting their web sites and exploring to see what is there for you. Check it out at www.aprl.org. The web site also has links to special collections that are available to researchers who make appointments to use these materials. Without knowing what is available, it could be impossible to discover these materials. That is why the museum has undertaken the job of creating finding guides for its collections. The finding guides are available online at postalmuseum.gov. Once you look at a few of these finding guides you will want to pay a visit to the National Postal Museum to see what other treasures are there to enjoy. The finding guides are PDF files that you can download on your own computer or print for future reference. Many specialty societies and clubs have their own libraries that are available for use by members. It is worthwhile to join organizations that match your particular interests in the hobby so that you can make use of the materials that are available. The Royal Philatelic Society London has recently created a database search. You do not have to be a member to use the database, but some content may not be accessible to nonmembers. The link to the database search is at www.rpsl.org. Many of the handouts are in the form of PDF files that you can read, download or print out. The British Library has an extensive stamp collection and research materials, and a substantial web site at www.bl.uk. From this landing spot, a collector or researcher has access to links that give an overview of the collections general, Great Britain, airmail, country and special collections, show some philatelic rarities, and provide information on how researchers can use the British Library materials. Use your preferred search engine such as Google, Yahoo or Bing, for example and search for your favorite stamp subjects. You will be amazed at what you can find.

EBT stands for Electronic Benefits Transfer, and state food stamps offices use these cards to digitally distribute program benefits to recipients. However, consumers must remember that there is also a variety of sites online that allow shoppers to pay for groceries with EBT cards. However, while the nature of these shopping trips changes, the actual products that recipients can purchase does not. Regardless of whether claimants are buying groceries online or at the store, they are still only permitted to buy edible food and beverage items. In any case, the sections below will provide food assistance recipients with a comprehensive list of some of the most appealing sites where they can use their EBT cards. However, beneficiaries must keep in mind that some of these stores may only accommodate EBT online food shopping in specific states. In order to avoid confusion, enrollees should check with their local stores before attempting to use EBT to buy groceries online in their areas. This means that SNAP claimants can pick out groceries from their own computers, place these items in a virtual cart and complete the orders without leaving their homes. At a later moment, the orders will be ready, and shoppers must drive to their nearest Walmart and pick up the groceries. Considering the fact that food assistance is only offered to low-income applicants, it might seem counterproductive that enrollees would need to pay a monthly fee for a service that allows them to use their EBT cards online. While enrollees may not use their SNAP benefits to pay this monthly fee, the lower cost and time saved by shopping online could make this an appealing option for recipients. However, recipients must note that they will be required to show their delivery persons proof of their enrollment with the food stamps program. However, this is a new program, and food stamps recipients are only permitted to use their EBT card online if they live in specific zip codes in the Bronx. Claimants must also keep in mind the following points: Associated fees – Shoppers who elect to pay with their food assistance cards at the FreshDirect website online will not need to pay additional delivery or tax fees. However, recipients are still responsible for paying the state bottle deposit. This is due to the fact that purchasers may not use multiple forms of payment to make their purchases. Therefore, if food stamps recipients do not have an EBT balance that covers the total price of their groceries, they will be unable to complete the purchase. Tipping – Credit and debit card holders have the opportunity to leave an e-tip for their delivery persons. This is because food stamps may not be used to pay for service fees and tips.

If you need to use a Scott Catalogue, and you have never used one before, this chapter may help you figure it out. As of , Scott has started releasing Catalogues as Apps for certain smartphones. Do not use a Scott catalog with a date of or earlier. Scott changed their method of valuing stamps at that time. Before buying a Scott catalog, first check out your local library. Many libraries will have recent issues in their reference section 4. If you only have USA stamps, this is a better book to use. It provides additional information and pricing on a wider variety of philatelic material than is available in the regular catalog. This also shows Scott catalog numbers and catalog values. It also has color pictures of the stamps while Scott uses black-and-white pictures. Many libraries also have it. This book, however, does not have as much detail about special collections, plate number coils, booklets, etc. Some libraries consider the above books as reference items, and they will not let you check them out. If that is the case, you have to bring your stamps to the library. If you have a volume album set, this may be tough. Many countries have alternate spellings for its name. If you have no idea where a country is located, check the index in the back of each Scott volume. If it lists a page number, you are in the correct volume. You will have to check the index again in volume x to find the page number. The next few sections contain word descriptions of things you will find in a Scott Catalogue. At the end of the chapter is a sample listing from a catalog. By looking at the sample, you will better understand the text. After that, all stamps for that country are organized and numbered in exactly the same order: Regular stamps Commemoratives and definitives: B1, B2, B3, B C1, C2, C3, C E1, E2, E3, E F1, F2, F3, F O1, O2, O3, O R1, R2, R3, R There are a lot of other one- or two-letter prefixes, but the ones above are the most common ones. Note, also, that the Scott numbers are more or less in the order the stamps were issued. The C1 is the first air-mail stamp issued, C2 is the second, etc. You may also see suffixes on the end of a stamp number. A little letter a, b, c C3a is the same stamp with the airplane printed upside down. You may also see this with se-tenants. Four stamps individually may be numbered , , and The a may be the block of four all attached together. You may also see this the other way around, too. The may be the block of four and a, b, c and d may be the individual stamps. A capital letter at the end A, B, C Suppose a government issues four stamps, and Scott numbers them 11, 12, 13 and Each has a value of 1 cent, 2 cents, 3 cents and 5 cents, respectively. Ten years later, the government decides to issue a 4-cent stamp in the same design. Scott has three choices and they use all three of them. You may encounter a situation where a stamp in an album is marked Scott number When you look in the Scott catalog, stamp may be totally different. If the change occurred twenty years ago, you have no choice but to look around to see if you can find the new number. If you are looking at regular stamps numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, etc. For regular stamps, a picture number starts with the letter A. You may see a listing that looks like this: The pictures appear in numerical order starting with A1 and continue upward. The picture is normally just above where the stamp is listed, and it always has a picture number to the left or right of it; however, it is possible that a picture may be several pages back. Just flip back until you find the proper picture. Once you grasp the concept that a picture number and a catalog stamp number are different, it is easy to go from the catalog number to the picture. There is one problem with all of this, however. There is not a picture of every stamp listed in the catalog. In a set of ten stamps with different face values, for example, all ten stamps may be referenced to only one picture. One will match the picture exactly, but the others will only be similar to the picture. Usually the difference is just the denomination of the stamp. If you have a stamp in hand, this sometimes causes a problem in trying to find its picture in the catalog. This is one reason collectors do not like broken sets! If you have a set of stamps in hand, most likely you will find a picture of the one with the lowest denomination. This might look like this: This is usually not an important fact to you. The final part is information about perforations. If you look at several different stamps, you may notice that the spacing between the perforation holes is different. Some are closer together, and some are farther apart. At times,

governments will issue the same stamp design, but they would perforate them differently. As far as collectors and the Scott catalog are concerned, you now have two different stamp numbers. If you want to measure the perforations on a stamp, you need to get a perforation gauge. See chapter 25 for how to order one. A perforation gauge is a piece of plastic or heavy paper with lines printed on it. Match the lines to the holes, and you can read how a stamp is perforated. Now do you know why you need the gauge? There are even a few stamps that are perforated differently on three or four sides. If you ever find one of these, I will leave it to you to read the entire section on perforations in the introduction section of each Scott catalog.

Researching Your Japanese Handgun If you are visiting this site to research basic information on a Japanese handgun you have just inherited or acquired, this section is for you. It is a guide to where to find information on the site. This photo shows the main types of Japanese handguns. What model is it? You should be able to spot your gun in the photo above: Type 26 revolver, Papa Nambu, Baby Nambu. You can also check the section on history Nambu World: You can get additional information by examining the photo galleries of my guns of each type go back to the main page to find them listed. There are a few rather rare guns that are not shown here, like the Hino-Komuro, Hamada, Sugiura, etc. Where was it made? The markings on Type 14s tell the story. Type 14 Markings-A Brief Overview. Company at their Kokubunji factory under Nagoya Arsenal supervision. Almost all other Japanese handguns you are likely to find were made by Tokyo Arsenal at Koishikawa a district of Tokyo. When was it made? If you have a Type 14 or Type 94 pistol, you are in luck. Almost all of them have the date on the right side. It is a number with a decimal point or comma , like 5. This is the date given in the Japanese system based on the reign of the Emperor. To convert the year to the Western system, add to the part of the number in front of the decimal or comma. For example, in the number The part of the number after the decimal point is the month: If you have a Japanese gun other than a Type 14 or Type 94, the exact date of production cannot generally be determined. The best one can do is estimate based on whether the serial number is early or late in the known range. See the section on production figures: Japanese Handgun Production Figures What is it worth? This question is impossible to answer without a detailed inspection and also depends on how and to whom you are selling it. Condition and matching numbers on the parts are extremely important: Tiny differences in condition that the average person would not notice can make a big difference in the amount a collector will pay. Also, price depends on the relative bargaining skills and motivation of the buyer and seller. The ones that bring more are mostly very early and very late guns, although a full discussion of this topic would take a book. Papa Nambus are mostly very beat up. Parts for these are hard to come by, so ones that are missing parts seldom bring good prices. However, Papa Nambus fit in Type 14 holsters and are often found in these later, less valuable holsters. TGE Babys bring a premium. The shoulder stock-holsters are also rare and worth a similar amount. The above are retail prices when you are selling directly to someone who wants the piece for his collection. If you are selling the gun to a dealer or someone who intends to resell it, they will typically offer around half to two-thirds of the values shown here. How can I sell it? The worst way is to walk into a gun show and offer it to someone. On the other hand, you do walk in with something to sell and walk out with cash. If you live in and your Japanese handgun or rifle or other gun is legally registered in Canada , I will probably be interested in buying it, so contact me using the e-mail link at the end of the main page. The very high cost of getting a gun through the US export permit process makes it impractical for me to buy guns from the USA in most cases unless it is a really key item for me see my wish list for the rare exceptions: Assuming you live in the USA.
