Cuneo Terence T Year working: But how many people are aware of the full range of his automobile art? How did he have such a painting style that allowed him to be so interested in the mechanical detail yet be able to handle the general scenes and landscapes? Terence Cuneo was born in London in the son of artist parents. At the age of around eighteen he bought the first of two Morgan three-wheelers that he owned. To supplement his income he also drove a London bus at one period. Fortunately he became successful in his illustration work but it did involve long hours working to short deadlines. During the war Terence Cuneo was a successful war artist working for the War Office and later the appointment to work with the War Artists Advisory Committee. As the war ended commissions from industrial clients rapidly increased. One of the important industrial clients was the Railway Companies and he commenced the superlative posters, which will be a permanent reminder to the quality of his art. These combine the talent for scenery with the mechanical detail and understanding of the locomotives, particularly impressive as they were often reproduced as large size posters. This was a special anniversary issue for the 50th year of the magazine "The early racing and record breaking Sunbeams were to the fore. Terence Cuneo expended considerable time researching the cars and backgrounds. For example for the picture of Chassagne in the record breaking V12 Sunbeam he drove his own Bentley along the Brooklands banking then he sketched the scene through the open sunshine roof. In addition to the Rootes calendars Terence Cuneo also produced art for calendars for Dunlop at least from to These were just single sheet illustrated boards with a calendar attached at the base. The illustrations were printed onto textured board and when they are framed under glass can look at first sight to be an original. In addition to the Rootes and Dunlop calendars he also did work for road safety calendars. Further industrial commissions came from other motor industry clients for advertising material and sales brochures such as diverse as Alvis, Ford and Armstrong Siddeley. Resulting from one of his commissions Terence Cuneo was asked to be the official artist for the official Coronation at Westminster Abbey in Whilst working in the studio on this large canvas, he was joined by the family cat that brought in a small field mouse. This generated a lot of interest with requests for further commissions. This gave the idea to include a mouse somewhere in the picture of subsequent finished works. This mouse foible was extended to anthropomorphised pictures of mice, his large picture of the French Grand Prix being an excellent example. It is a scene from the French Grand Prix with the cars being driven by rodents. Terence Cuneo was one of the great artists of the twentieth century and we are very fortunate that he included so many motoring subjects in his portfolio. In his honour a statue of the artist was unveiled by the Princess Royal at Waterloo Station in Bentleys at Brooklands Bentley racing the Blue Train Pencil sketch of the first steam vehicle Watercolour of Trevithick steam carriage!

They were both established artists who had met in Paris whilst studying under Whistler. His early working life involved working as an illustrator for magazines, books and periodicals. Then, in he started working in oils, continuing with his illustration work. During the Second World War he was a sapper in the Army, but also spent much of his time painting for the War Artists Advisory Committee, providing invaluable illustrations of aircraft factories and wartime events. When the War was over, Terence was commissioned to produce a series of works illustrating railways, bridges and locomotives. A significant point in his career was his appointment as official artist for the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, which brought his name before the public worldwide. He received more commissions from industry, which included depicting manufacturing, mineral extraction and road building. He was most famous for his passion for engineering subjects, particularly locomotives and the railway as a whole, not to mention his wide range of specialist military works. In fact Terence painted an enormous range of other subjects from big game in Africa to landscapes in Europe. Further success was achieved in his regimental commissions and battle scenes as well as portraits, which include Her Majesty the Queen and Field Marshal Montgomery. Since , his paintings have included a small mouse, his trademark, which can often be difficult to find, and many people enjoy scouring his paintings to find it. His work has been used in a variety of ways, from book jackets and model railway catalogues to posters and jigsaws and even Royal Mail postage stamps. Terence Cuneo was granted Freedom of the City of London in Sadly Terence died in London on 3 January However, his paintings live on in so many places around the globe, a permanent reminder of such a wonderfully talented man. The larger-than-life bronze memorial statue of Terence Cuneo, by Philip Jackson, which stood, has now been moved to Brompton Barracks, Chatham. Terence Cuneo married Catherine Monro in They brought up two daughters, Linda and Carole. There are three grandchildren, Andrew, Melanie and Cindy. She is President of the Cuneo Society and provides enormous support to all its activities.
