Did you learn anything that surprised you? Examine the many ways in which Charlotte dramatized her own life experiences in her novels. How many people, places and events from her real life can you identify in Jane Eyre? Compare and contrast Charlotte Bronte and her fictional creation, Jane Eyre, in terms of physical appearance, personality, romantic sensibilities and psychological desires. How successful is each woman in rising above the societal limitations placed upon her? Do they each ultimately remain true to themselves?

The Secret Diaries of Charlotte Bronte by Syrie James is a fictional account of the life of Charlotte Bronte. Charlotte grew up with two sisters and a brother under the supervision of her parson father.

In her family moved a few miles to the village of Haworth , where her father had been appointed perpetual curate of St Michael and All Angels Church. Maria died of cancer on 15 September , leaving five daughters, Maria, Elizabeth, Charlotte, Emily and Anne , and a son, Branwell , to be taken care of by her sister, Elizabeth Branwell. After the deaths of his older daughters, Patrick removed Charlotte and Emily from the school. Charlotte and Branwell wrote Byronic stories about their jointly imagined country, Angria, and Emily and Anne wrote articles and poems about Gondal. They provided them with an obsessive interest during childhood and early adolescence, which prepared them for literary vocations in adulthood. Around about , her stories shifted from tales of the supernatural to more realistic stories. In particular, from May to July she was employed by the Sidgwick family at their summer residence, Stone Gappe , in Lothersdale, where one of her charges was John Benson Sidgwick , an unruly child who on one occasion threw a Bible at Charlotte, an incident that may have been the inspiration for a part of the opening chapter of Jane Eyre in which John Reed throws a book at the young Jane. Charlotte returned alone to Brussels in January to take up a teaching post at the school. Her second stay was not happy: She returned to Haworth in January and used the time spent in Brussels as the inspiration for some of the events in The Professor and Villette. First publication[edit] In May Charlotte, Emily and Anne self-financed the publication of a joint collection of poems under their assumed names Currer, Ellis and Acton Bell. It tells the story of a plain governess, Jane, who, after difficulties in her early life, falls in love with her employer, Mr Rochester.
