How People of Faith Are Using Computers and the Internet Introduction In his article, "Christian Scholarship and The Philosophical Analysis of Cyberspace Technologies," Douglas Groothuis points out that the recent explosion of cyberspace technologies into modern culture has raised some important issues and questions for Christian scholars who want to bring a Christian perspective to computer-mediated forms of communication. In doing this, this article will address two issues. First, this work will survey how Americans in general and Christians in particular are using computers and the Internet. Second, this work will give a theological evaluation of some of the intellectual opportunities and moral concerns that these new technologies bring. Without going so far as to say that computers and the Internet are neutral tools with equal potential for good and bad, ³ this work will argue that computer technology brings both great intellectual opportunities and potential for harm and evil. Christians, therefore, must understand and utilize computer technology in a way that brings good and furthers the cause of the Gospel in a way pleasing to the Lord. How Computers and the Internet are Being Used The specific opportunities that computers and the Internet offer are too numerous to mention. Nevertheless, the major benefits these technologies offer can be summarized in the categories of information and communication. First, the Internet offers easy and quick access to enormous amounts of information. Demy states, "Staggering amounts of information are available to anyone with a phone line and a personal computer. Second, the Internet has opened up new means of instant communication with the advent of email and chat rooms. From nearly any location, including home, people can communicate with others almost anywhere in the world with little cost. By typing in an email address and hitting the send button, messages can be sent without the hassle of handwriting a letter, licking stamps and finding a mailbox. Emails already outnumber physical mail now aptly called "snail mail. In , 1 million Americans used the Internet. Other common uses include maintaining existing relationships, buying products, and previewing new media. Steve Hewitt claims that Christians have had a slow start when it comes to computer usage. A study by the Barna Research Group, revealed that "Born again Christians have the same rate of adoption of modern technology as do adults who are not born again. These figures are identical with the overall use of these items by the general American adult population. According to Barna, "More than nine out of ten Senior Pastors use a computer at home or at the church. This compares with fifty-percent for the American adult population as a whole. One out of every three Protestant churches , in the United States has a Web site. Among the two-thirds of churches that do not, nineteen percent say they definitely will have one within the next twelve months. As Barna has stated: You can buy books on the Internet, strike up relationships on the Internet and a growing proportion of the population are experiencing God in cyberspace as well. Among the growing number of Americans who use the Internet, millions are turning to the digital dimension to get them in touch with God and others who pursue faith matters. More than three million people a day get religious or spiritual material from the Internet. According to the Pew study, the top five activities of Religious Surfers on the Internet are: Most who used the Internet for religious experiences indicated that they were likely to use the Internet even more in the future. As Barna has observed: When people were asked about their likely future use of the Internet to seek or engage in specific types of religious experiences, more than two-thirds indicated that they were likely to engage in such pursuits on a regular basis as the decade progresses. Nevertheless, this section will address four key issues associated with computer technology. Some have expressed concern that the popularity of the Internet will cause many people of faith to participate more in online church than in a physical church. Barna, for example, has predicted that a growing number of people will use the Internet as their primary religious experience. He believes that by the end of the present decade, "50 million Americans

will seek to have their spiritual experience solely through the Internet, rather than at a church; and upwards of million Americans will rely upon the Internet to deliver some aspects of their religious experience. Barna offer an interesting scenario: Fifteen years from now you may tell your grandchildren that back in the old days, when people wanted a religious experience they attended a church for that purpose. Chances are good that your children will be shocked by such a revelation. Seventy-four percent of Religious Surfers attend religious services at least once a week. It is also possible that the Internet, at times, may actually help spiritual communities. Eighty-three percent of congregations who use the Internet have indicated that Web sites and the use of email have helped the spiritual life of their congregations either some or a lot. The Pew report points out that these are "communal benefits" and although Web sites cannot create new communities, "communities can create vibrant Web presences that redound to the benefit of their members. Too Much of a Good Thing? Like many Americans, Christians, too, have jumped on "the information superhighway" and have benefited from the information and communication opportunities that computers and the Internet have provided. Two popular books that have introduced Christians to the Internet and its benefits are Jason D. With Christian purposes specifically in mind, the authors show their readers how to engage in online Bible study, access Christian periodicals, keep in touch with missionaries, join Christian discussion groups, and participate in dozens of other Christian related activities. Both authors are excited about the opportunities that computers and the Internet bring. As Baker tells his readers: We can minister, explore, research, and even share the gospel message with millions as a result of the availability of telecommunications. They are able to access online information that can supplement lessons and find valuable resources such as online encyclopedias, newspapers and libraries. Home-school families also find support and interaction with other home-schoolers. According to Sue Bohlin, "plugged-in" home-school families "report that the encouragement of their online home-school communities is often what keeps them going. Users of the Internet, though, must grapple with how to approach so much information and how to sort the valuable information from non-helpful information. Tillman has observed, however, "Within the morass of networked data are both valuable nuggets and an incredible amount of junk. It is, however, not so much the amount of information that causes problems but the inability of people to process information. How can one use the Internet efficiently, discerning what is junk from what is useful? Tillman asserts that Internet users need to use "the same critical evaluative skills" in looking for information on the Internet that they would use in a book, a paper index, a musical score, or an online commercial database. Vanity sites are sites "where an individual decides to share working papers or information they have been working on for a dissertation. The major categories Internet users should be aware of in evaluating a Web site include author, purpose, source, content, style, and functionality. Some important factors for evaluating a Web site include: Experts also suggest that Internet users learn how to prioritize and winnow information. For instance, when information comes in, whether through email or the Internet, experts recommend that people take action on it or discard it immediately. Data is like food. A good meal is served in reasonably- sized portions from several food groups. It leaves you satisfied but not stuffed. According to an article published by U. News and World Report , the scope of this dark side of the Internet has not been comprehended by most people: The popular image of the Web is one of earnest geeks and capitalist kids gulping a Starbucks as they sling code. Pornographers and pedophiles on the Web, sadly, are nothing new. But because the Internet is so vast and uncharted, the full scope of its dark side has never been fully explored. And the amount of bad stuff out there is truly staggering. Clearly, every Christian must avoid participation in all immoral and unethical behavior. Parents, in particular, should take steps to shield their children from Internet perversion and child solicitation. Christian men must also take protective measures. Online pornography appears to be one of the greatest threats to the spirituality of Christian men. According to Christian Computing Magazine , "Online pornography poses a greater threat to Christian men and leaders than ANY other type of pornography on the market. Communication, thus, was a full- bodied event with facial expressions and body language clearly evident. With the development of telecommunications, though, communication has become more of a disembodied event as people communicate without their full physical presence. Information

technologies disembody the information they carry to various degrees. Even the shift from an oral to a written culture tended to disembody knowledge. What once required memorization and recitation by living persons could now be retrieved through the dead pages of papyri, parchment, or paper. Or take the telephone. It extends the voice far beyond the capacities of the vocal chords but also severs the voice from the face and body. He argues that cyberspace is a "disembodied medium " because "information is produced and exchanged through computers via telephone lines without the physical bulk of paper or the face- to- face element of conversation. As the title of his book, *The Soul in Cyberspace* , indicates, people can escape their bodies and travel in cyberspace taking on different identities and sometimes acting in ways they normally would not if their physical presence were required. A man who would never look at pornography at a local magazine stand can anonymously visit pornographic Web sites. As Groothuis puts it, "The fantasy enclaves. A Purposeful-Life. Spiritual exploration has always been for me the place that felt like home. When engaged in inner-work, meditation and this spiritual exploration that fascinated and stimulated me, my sense of purpose in life was complete.

They all merged together, and they always seemed to present themselves at the worst possible times. The simplest things, like getting out of bed in the morning, felt so heavy. The best joys in life, like being with family and creating new connections, felt unsatisfying. Things were heavy, hard, and almost unbearable. Everything transformed for me when I decided to focus on creating purpose in my life. Life is a whole different experience when you understand what guides you. Let me shift gears with a question: Why did you come to Tiny Buddha today? In the 1950s, neuroscientist Paul MacLean invented the Triune Brain Model which says you have three parts to your brain: The reptilian instinctual part The mammalian emotional part The primate thinking part The reptilian and mammalian parts of your brain are very basic in nature. The reptilian handles things like aggression and territory. The mammalian handles things like food and sex. But now we come to the thirdâ€”thinkingâ€”primate part of your brain. This is the part of your brain that knows deep, deep down, you need meaning in your life! Unlike Freud, who said our main motives are sex and aggression, Frankl surmised that our dominant driving force is to find meaning in life. You see, Frankl experienced something that Freud never had. In the 1940s, Frankl was held prisoner in Nazi concentration camps. Frankl lived that reality. He felt the horror of losing everything only to be tortured and terrorized. With all the agony and brutality, what kept Frankl from giving up his relentless fight for his life? A quote by Nietzsche nicely sums up his philosophy on how people were able to survive the camps, without losing the will to live: Torture, brutality, unimaginable inhumanityâ€”purpose supersedes it all. Purpose is what gives us the strength to carry on, if not through dire conditions, then through difficult changes, transitions, relationships, and activities. Your micro level purpose is to know your values, and then, be in integrity with them. When you know what you stand for, and do what you believe in, your confidence and sense of self-worth will be sky-high, regardless of how much the situation sucks. Your macro level purpose is something different. In his Tiny Buddha contribution, *Discovering Happiness through Purpose in 3 Natural Steps*, Scott Dinsmore explored three things that must align for you to discover your purpose: We all want to better ourselves and our lives, but purposeâ€”like success and happinessâ€”is counterintuitive. The more you aim at it and make it a target, the more you are going to miss it. You want more money? Help people make money! You want more joy in life? Give joy to people! Sounds so simple, right? The equation looks like this: Start by creating 3 lists: Your values Your strengths Your passions The key is to figure out how you can combine your passions and strengths in service to a cause, person, community, or organization other than yourself. Do that and your values will fall into place. Your income must be greater than your expenses! I know it sounds like a massive lifestyle change to get rid of these things, but a massive lifestyle change may be exactly what you need in order to find and live your purpose. As Frankl wrote, suffering when not necessary is masochistic, not heroic! This journey called life will be over before you realize it. I highly recommend checking it out! Chapter 4 : How People of Faith Are Using Computers and the Internet

Let's examine together the spiritual implications of technology use, our larger concerns about technology related to student faith formation, and pedagogical directions that will best help our schools to meet their missions and equip our students.

Harrill Your life has many purposes. Many are fulfilled in your day-to-day life and you do not think of them as purposes. Yet you could say meaning and purpose motivated each choice, each experience, and each role you have played that taught you lessons about yourself, your relationships, people, organizations, and how life works. The learning and growth that has or is taking place from each experience moves you forward to greater awareness and can be seen as a purpose in your life. Some of you may choose to look broader and see the major theme or spiritual reason for your life. Do you know your spiritual purpose or are you ready to take on another assignment? Destiny calls some people in a direct, clear fashion and others in a general nonspecific way. Some people are very aware of their mission while others are not. Some people seek their spiritual purpose actively and others simply allow life to direct them not giving it much thought. Some do not have the need to define what they do as a spiritual purpose and other people do. If you have reached mid life or later life, it is common to seek deeper meaning and purpose for your life, beyond involvement with your family or work. To self-actualize further some of you may feel the urge to make a contribution to society, to help humanity and the world by using the wisdom gleaned from your life experiences and by using your gifts and talents. We will look at different ways people discover deeper meaning and purpose with some real life examples. I will also share some of my process of discovering my spiritual purpose. If you want to know your spiritual purpose or move on to another one there is a Life-Purpose Inventory at the end of this article to help you get started with this process. Those of you already on your path may use this information for clarity and to celebrate how you are already fulfilling your spiritual mission. Some of you do not recognize that your spiritual Self, soul, or God substitute the right word for you has called you to express your life in a certain direction. Without defining it as a spiritual purpose, you may have had a lot of inner drive to accomplish certain goals or to develop and use certain talents many times as an avocation. If you were to turn around and review your life, you might see some important patterns that point in the direction of seeing your purpose. Maybe you had a strong desire to build or refinish furniture, to raise orchids, to know the names of local trees and birds, to write letters to the editor in your local paper, or to start your own business. I will tell you about two people that I believe are expressing their spiritual purpose in this way, yet might not describe it such terms. If it happens to benefit others that is great; however, the fact is, if it brings more joy, peace, and love into your life, it benefits the world. How do you reach deeper to find spiritual meaning and purpose that will motivate, stimulate, and enrich your life at any age? Let us look at two processes. There is a yin, or gentle, passive, or flowing approach, which allows your spiritual purpose to find you. Then there is the yang, directive, active, or seeking approach to finding your spiritual purpose. Many of you have experienced a combination of both processes. Let me illustrate how the yin approach worked for two of my friends where for each their spiritual purpose found them. Friend number one had been on the journey to wholeness and self-awareness for a long time and had done a lot of inner healing before this purpose appeared. My friend and her husband adopted their granddaughter as a two-year-old. This was a total surprise and if you had asked my friend earlier if this was in the cards, she would have been the loudest person to protest. It evolved gradually and one day during a family crisis she just knew what she needed to do. Parenting this child with all the awareness that she now has is her spiritual mission and she is very conscious of the fact. Breast cancer catapulted friend number two into her spiritual purpose which is healing her consciousness. This required her early on to review her life, looking at possible causes for the illness and healing the broken relationships with her husband and children. Nothing goes ignored by this woman and it has been over 15 years now. She uses her wake-up call as a path to wholeness, always going directly into the next issue that surfaces to be healed.

For example, she has learned to feel and work with her emotions, the unhappy ones, as well as learning what joy and love are really about. Her daily spiritual practice time is a deeply ingrained pattern now. She uses art, journal writing, reading, and therapy to help her process years of pain and grief. She is actively involved helping, instead of avoiding, her mentally ill grown son and building honest communication with her husband. Both of these women are aware of the spiritual purpose active in their lives. Some of you may have had similar experiences where Life handed you your spiritual purpose. The statement "taking heaven by storm" fit me well for many years. I actively went seeking the meaning of my life and dug deep to know my purpose. Answers were given to me; however, it was not until I was older that the information made much sense to me and it was then I felt the passion to actualize them. Timing is so important in living your life and fulfilling your missions. You can get answers when you ask, yet the time to actualize them depends on so many things: Because I was so determined and so yang in my exploration of self and my inner healing, I found out a general overview of my life purpose early, at the age of thirty. The theme of my life I discovered is so simple that I almost did not get it. How did I find out? Part of my self-discovery process was to take workshops. In one exercise at a workshop, the participants were regressed backward in time before birth to meet their spiritual essence or soul. In the guided meditation we were asked many questions; such as, why did we choose our specific country, family, and time period to be born into, etc. We were asked why we chose our particular sex, race, and characteristics. One of the questions the facilitator asked was "What is your spiritual purpose? What was I given as my spiritual purpose? It was simply to teach what I know. I was not impressed and I put the paper away for many years thinking that it was not much of a purpose. When the time was right I found that paper again and by this time I had a much better grasp of its meaning. By that point in time I had given talks, facilitated groups and workshops, been in private practice as a therapist, and written several self-help books on topics relating to inner healing and understanding oneself. I smiled when I read this early glimpse of my purpose because that is exactly what I was doing. I was teaching others what I know based upon my own experiences and those things that have helped me on my journey to inner healing. In my presentations I had been prefacing most of my talks with, "I share with you what works for me and what I know is true for me from my experiences. About six years later I had a powerful dream that spoke to me with a specific way to actualize this purpose. A few of my friends were going to a weekend intensive workshop with a spiritual teacher. I wanted to go; however, the timing was not right for me to attend. My purpose as a wife and mother were pulling me stronger at that time. A weekend away was not in the cards. To my pleasant surprise I had a powerful dream that night that showed me that I really did not have to go to the workshop to receive a blessing from this guru. I remember in the dream humbly walking up to the guru spiritual teacher and asking her what my purpose was. She smiled, bowed her head, looked up and said, "It is writing. At that time I had written maybe two articles for a local metaphysical paper and felt very incompetent as a writer. It was a lot of work for me to do those two articles. I could not believe at the time that writing could possibly be on my spiritual agenda. Again, I smile now as I look back. It makes perfect sense to me now; yet, it sure did not then. I am aware now I had the grace to find my spiritual purpose early, so it would be in the back of my mind as I was building my confidence, my self-esteem, my awareness, my patience, and raising my children. Even though I did not have the maturity to understand either experience fully, I pondered them many times and remembered them when I needed the courage to step forward on my path. Now look at your own life. If you are not yet sure of what your spiritual purpose is, do you want to explore your consciousness to find out? Maybe you have a sense of completing a lot of lessons and are ready to take another step to find your spiritual purpose or another one? Do you know yourself pretty well and have you done much inner healing? Have you been asking yourself "Who Am I? Why am I here? What is my spiritual contribution to the world? How do I tune into divine guidance to direct my life? Those of you just getting started on the spiritual journey, remember it is not a race and we do not compare ourselves with anyone else. We open when our timing is right. Many people discover their life purpose while they are in a process of self-discovery and inner healing. Others do not consciously know it for a long while. Those of you who are on the yang side of the equation can take the

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Life-Purpose Inventory to help you start the deeper process. Get your journal out so you will have a record of your answers and insights for further study. Ignore any negative self-talk that wants to sabotage your spiritual blossoming. Fear and doubt may try to stop the inner guidance coming to you by telling you that you are not capable, evolved enough, or worthy enough to participate in life in a larger way. Remember it is your spiritual essence you want to tap into that is beyond all the negative conditioning. Allow the process to unfold as you weave together the tapestry of your higher purpose. Honor the proper timing for you. During your process pay attention to your dreams and jot down any messages, ideas, desires, visions, suggestions, hunches, or feelings you receive.
